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## EDITORIAL

### USING OUR VOICES

Every so often we are irritated by a seemingly insoluble problem. Anxiety and worry can be tiring in themselves, but more wearing is the frustration of being unable to do anything about an event or condition which is bothering us. Personal and private matters have to be solved by us alone, but in public affairs all citizens do have an effective voice if they make use of the means to amplify it.

First, there is the press. This paper, which is a public service, exists for the benefit of all readers. The Editor frequently hears of the far-reaching effects of particular items published, and this is not surprising in view of the paper's extensive distribution. What better place to air a public grievance or make a public suggestion, especially on local issues? Not that the "Valley Voice" wishes to become a complaints department; the point is, the facility exists, a facility which in itself is a basic human right, and one which this country recognises as such. Of course some letters received by this paper would have had more effect had they been sent to the person or organisation concerned. However, in public matters, a great deal of support can be mustered by a letter to the press, especially if the writer signs his name. Clearly there are occasions when a pen-name serves to protect the writer's interests, but most people will agree that a signature gives greater impact to a letter than that of a pen-name.

A second public voice exists. We frequently complain of that political bombardment on television and in the press which precedes federal or state elections. But how many of us make proper use of those Members we elect? A politician's service to the public takes many forms, but the one most neglected by the electorate is often the most potent: that is, first-hand oral or written discussion with a particular Member. Those readers who have expressed their views in this way will appreciate the value of political service, and most likely will have found that politicians are actually human and more approachable than previously thought. A common complaint is that politicians are out of touch with the needs of their

electorate. Well whose fault is that? Other public organisations can serve our interests. In this state the Consumer Protection Council is gaining strength. It encourages complaints about commercial products and services, and its success in dealing efficiently with those matters it receives has been quietly spectacular. "Choice", the journal of the Australian Consumers' Association, welcomes letters about poor goods and services, and in view of its national distribution, is an influential means of sharing views. The A.B.C. has recently begun its "Access" programme at 10.15 on Wednesday nights. The A.B.C. makes its Sydney facilities and personnel available to any interested persons, and the group concerned simply prepares and presents a programme in which their particular views are best expressed. The main problem is the expense of travelling to Sydney, but sufficient pressure in the right places could lead to commercial or national television providing a similar programme in Tasmania.

Unfortunately there is one avenue of public voice which we do not have: that is the service of an ombudsman. In general terms, he is employed to investigate and act upon personal injustices caused, unwittingly or otherwise, by government departments. It is the "Valley Voice's" opinion that this appointment is a vital, integral element of fair government, irrespective of which party is in power.

# just yarnin'

The 'Walk-about' Quakers George Walker, and James Backhouse visited the Australian colony over a period of 6 years ending in 1838 to spread the Gospel of the Society of Friends.

On walking North from Seymour, Backhouse remarks in his journal that they saw foot-prints of Tasmanian tigers and 'bush devils' in the sand.

They came at length to Falmouth where a friend from Scotland, one David Stead was overseer on an estate belonging to a Dr. Henderson, who had returned to India. This property was then named 'Huckamabad', but is now known as 'Glencoe'. Archibald McIntyre the next owner gave it this name that being the birth place of his wife in Scotland.

Walker wrote in his journal on April 1833 that 'Stead has been three years in the colony. He was glad to see us and kindly accommodated us in the best way he could, J. Backhouse sleeping in his hammock, I under a kangaroo rug and E. Cotton in an adjoining house belonging to a neighbour, the only settler between this place and George's River 20 miles distant.' David Stead was Karl von Steiglitz's grandfather.

This early house where Stead lived still stands in the farmyard at 'Glencoe', Backhouse described it as being superior to many out-stations, but inferior to the generality of settler's homes. It was built of upright split timber, plastered inside, and divided to the height of the walls into four apartments, a sitting room, bedroom, kitchen, and store room. The last room had a lock, the other only having latches, and windows were covered by canvas stretched on wooden frames.

The kitchen was also the sleeping place of prisoner-servants.

Backhouse continues: 'The timber here on a low piece of land is remarkably tall and slender. Trees had been felled up to 140' high, and up to 200 feet.....From whales occasionally cast upon the shores the settlers supply themselves with oil. This is not infrequent on other parts of the coast also, they are probably fish that escape after being struck by the people from the whaling vessels which are stationed in some of the bays, or cruise about.' 'After a meeting some of the people noticed it was the first time the Gospel had been preached here'.
