ANZAC DAY by Drew Hunter

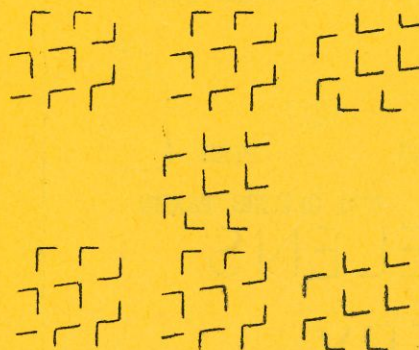
I saw a kid a marching with medals on his chest

DAIRY ADJUSTMENT PROGRAMME

The Australian Government's dairy adjustment programme is proving of great benefit to many Tasmanian Dairy farmers.

In reviewing the operation of the scheme, Senator Ken Wriedt Australian Minister for Agriculture, said that conversion to refrigerated bulk vats by cream suppliers constituted the great majority of applications for assistance under the scheme.

Senator Wriedt said that so great was the interest after the announcement of the scheme, and before the legislation had actually gone through parliament, that a considerable bank-up occurred and delayed the processing of applications. Now that the scheme is under way, applications take about six weeks to process mainly because of the need for an on-farm inspection by Agricultural bank officers to carry out a viability test.

All finance under the scheme is provided interest-free by the Australian Government.

So far 95 applications for conversion to refrigerated bulk vats have been approved with a further 62 still pending. Loans for amalgamation and development of properties approved total 31 with 40 still being processed. The value of the loans so far approved now total nearly \$700,000.

Senator Wriedt said that under the old dairy bounty this type of assistance was not possible and did not help the cream supplier to move into the more lucrative whole milk supply system.

To illustrate the advantages accruing to the industry by this method of assistance. Cream suppliers received an interim rate in 1972/73 of 39 cents, whereas this year the interim rate has only increased to 41 cents. By contrast, whole milk suppliers who received an interim rate in 1972/73 of 51 cents will this year receive 62 cents.

Because of the changing pattern of market requirements for processed milk products, it is essential that the industry moves steadily towards whole milk supply and the provision of the interest free loans will greatly assist cream suppliers to make the necessary change, Senator Wriedt added.

YOU & THE LAW

Some information for the locals who do their shopping in Launceston or who are frequent visitors to Launceston.

If you drive your car to the City, be careful that you do not drive in the "New Pedestrian Malls" in Brisbane Street, between St. John St. and Charles St.

A recent amendment to the Traffic Regulations prohibits the use of vehicles in the mall, unless it is a classified vehicle, such as a vehicle being used by the Hydro Electric Company, City Council, Fire Brigade or Police.

Another matter which I also want to draw to attention, particularly to Parents, is the use of trail bikes, and Mini bikes or similar vehicles.

Should your child have your authority to use a mini bike or trail bike, then I would suggest to you that you should choose very carefully the particular area on which the child will use the machine because a recent ruling on the use of trail, mini bikes and beach buggies, has in fact completely included their use within the Traffic Act and Regulations. In other words, they cannot be driven on a beach or in any other area to which the public have access, without the machine being registered and the rider or driver licensed. So unless they are used on private property where consent has been obtained from the property owner, a child cannot ride or drive the machine.

If you should want further information on this subject then please call and see us, that way you will protect yourself and your child.

She landed a 3lb 14½oz Gurnard just on dusk on Saturday evening. It was hooked on a surf "bug". Denny Matthews of St. Helens was second with another Gurnard only 10oz lighter. It is uncommon to see this species of fish caught in the surf. Third prize was won by David Jervis of Westbury with a 3lb 7oz Blackback. Eric Linton of St. Helens weighed in the first fish for the contest by hooking a cocky salmon within seconds of the starting gun. Rumour has it that Eric foul-hooked the fish as he wound in after another angler cast across his line. There was an alltime record number of entries, just over 400, but many failed to catch a fish. Highlight of Saturday night was the removal of five reels from their rods while their owners were sleeping or were otherwise engaged. Prompt action by St. Helens Police recovered the lot on Sunday morning. This was just as well since three reels belonged to an off duty police officer. HEALTH NOTES

As this is rose hip season it seems fitting to make mention of the value of these precious berries. They are to be found all along roads and paddock fences, a thorny bush with bright red berries. Rose hips are exceptionally high in vitamin C which makes a good natural supplement for the lack of citrus fruits in Tasmania in winter.

Vitamin C is essential for the prevention and cure of colds. Half a cup of Rose Hips brought to the boil, in 2 pints of water mashed, strained into a cup and sweetened with honey and a dash of cider vinegar makes a wonderful tea also a very effective medicine.

Some European countries use rose hips extensively to supply vitamin C and to make Jams, Jellies etc.

Rose hips must be dried in order to be kept for winter, a good way is to thread them with a needle and string or cotton whilst they are still firm but waste no time as the season is now at its peak.

GARDEN and BEAUTY

Have you thought of using fruit and vegetables for the outside of your body as well as using them on the inside, health and beauty all at one go. Avocados are good for your health and if you have dry skin cleanse thoroughly then rub the fleshy insides of the skins gently over your face and neck. Rub a few drops of cream (milk or goat) as a treat for your skin.

All the crisp vegetables and fruits like celery, carrots, and apples which form a part of any sensible diet, are good for your teeth too, apart from cleansing your teeth they provide healthy exercise for your gums.

Honey is a very good food both inside and out, you can make your own skin cleanser by blending; $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon apple cider vinegar and 2 tablespoons honey, spread gently over the face and neck, leave on 15-20 minutes, then rinse off with tepid water and pat dry. Strawberries in season make a very good food for the skin, one or two crushed and gently patted on, leave for 20 minutes rinse off and pat dry, and its wonderful. Cucumber skins are good too.

All this shows that one can use fruit and vegetables in more ways than you think for health and beauty.

"JUST TARNIN"

Furneau named St. Helens Point in 1773, as was shown on his charts issued in 1813 and the township received its name from this source.

Michael and Alexander McLoed, who came from Inverness with their father, Major McLoed, were the first settlers at St. Helens, the father took up a grant near Evandale which he named "Tallisker". The two McLoeds applied for land grants in 1828, but Wedge who visited St. Helens a couple of years later to survey there liked the place so well that he selected 564 acres for himself, a claim which the McLoeds disputed; however Wedge was successful. He also purchased 640 acres on Moulting Lagoon north of "Bayview" which became known as "Nicks". This was in 1836, but by 1852 he had sold all his land in this area to the Treloggans. Alexander McLoed was granted 640 acres in 1831 between Georges River and Moulting lagoon, which became known as "Bay view" but this property went to William Talbot of "Malahide" in 1836.

Captain Moriarty bought the next selection in 1831, it comprises 1,000 acres extending out to St. Helens Point from the present Steiglitz.

Michael and Thomas Coffee leased "Bay view" from Talbot before 1840, and they built the "Black swan Inn" on the western side of Moulting Lagoon which is now a residence, and probably the oldest building extant in the district. The rowvy whalers and sealers who made their living round these coasts frequented the "Black Swan" after mooring their boats to Humbug Point.

Early in the 1870's Michael Coffee built an 8 roomed brick house for himself which in time became the basis of the St. Helens Hotel. The Coffees were very active men, they owned land as far North as Anson's Bay on which they ran cattle, and by the 60's John Steel of Falmouth was buying their total yearly output of store cattle. They were mustered at the "Black Swan" where the buying of 300 head took place each year after which Mr. Steel drove the cattle home to his property to be fattened up. Later on when they were ready they were driven in lots of 50 up the Pass on their way to market, the majority in Hobart, but some went to settlers in the Fingal Valley this big annual drive of so many fine sleek beasts was a fine sight well known by the people in the district.

Michael Coffee was the licensee of the "Black Swan" for two periods from 1862. He and his brother had been convicted in England for 10 years for releasing 3 of their heifers from the pound, which was called cattle stealing. However they received conditional pardons in '49 settling first in the Fingal Valley before moving to the coast.

BOMBERS V ALL BLACKS With a narrow lead of 1 goal at half time the Bombers increased their lead against the All Blacks to 28 points to 18.

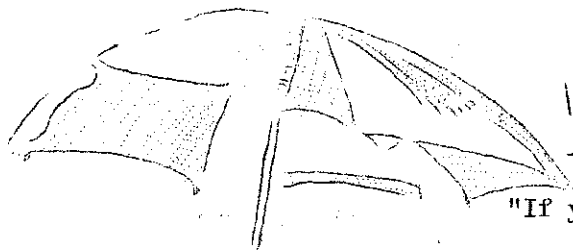

VILLAINS V PACEMAKERS The Villains held their lead and went on to win what proved to be one of the best games played this season. The final score being 35 to 28.

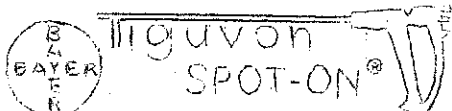
ALL BLACKS V WHITES The Whites had a run-away victory with some excellent shooting in the second half, the final score being 43 points to 20.
