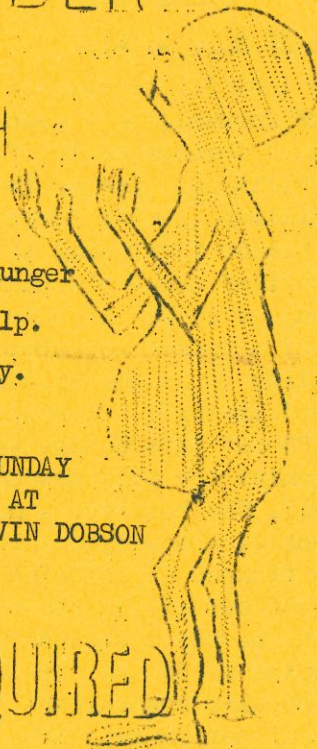

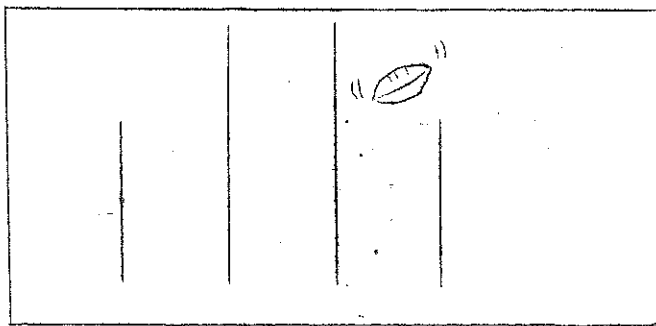

YOU AND THE LAW

KATH'S TOUR

My first impression is that even the small townships have a nature strip in the main street, and most of them we went through had trees in the side streets too. Victorian towns had most. They had a better rainfall and soil, and grew Avenues of Norfolk pines or English trees, a few had gum trees.

South Australia hasn't got the advantages that Tasmania has, no rivers except the Torrens and that's not a big river, and the bottom end of the Murray, which is piped all around from Murray Bridge to Adelaide, Port Augusta even Ceduna. One sees this huge pipe line going all around with water for the towns. Also South Australia hasn't any natural forests, so nearly all the buildings are stone, cement or bricks & very few chimneys as they burn oil for heating, and they make electricity with coal.

They have hundreds of miles of pine forests and the oldest are now being cut. The stone buildings are beautifully built and look to have at least 6 rooms, all with verandahs and what took my eye, all with 2 or 3 orange trees in the garden. Everyone seems very tree conscious, but suppose if you only had a few and those scraggy you would rapidly put in some more.

We saw the new town of Elizabeth, its beautifully designed, but people haven't lived there long enough to give it much character yet. We also saw the very old town of Harndorf. It was settled in 1839 by German Settlers, and its got character alright. The buildings look delightful, I didn't go into any, but they are cared for outside all clean and so tidy not a scrap of litter anywhere. The gutters looked swept and I saw one of loveliest wall flowers. It was deep mauve with the centre petals a deep tawny purple, really lovely, in a stone walled garden with a lovely old house and pot plants on the verandah. I must tell you also about Geelong, in the street we went through they had meters with a pair of arms in which they put flower pots.

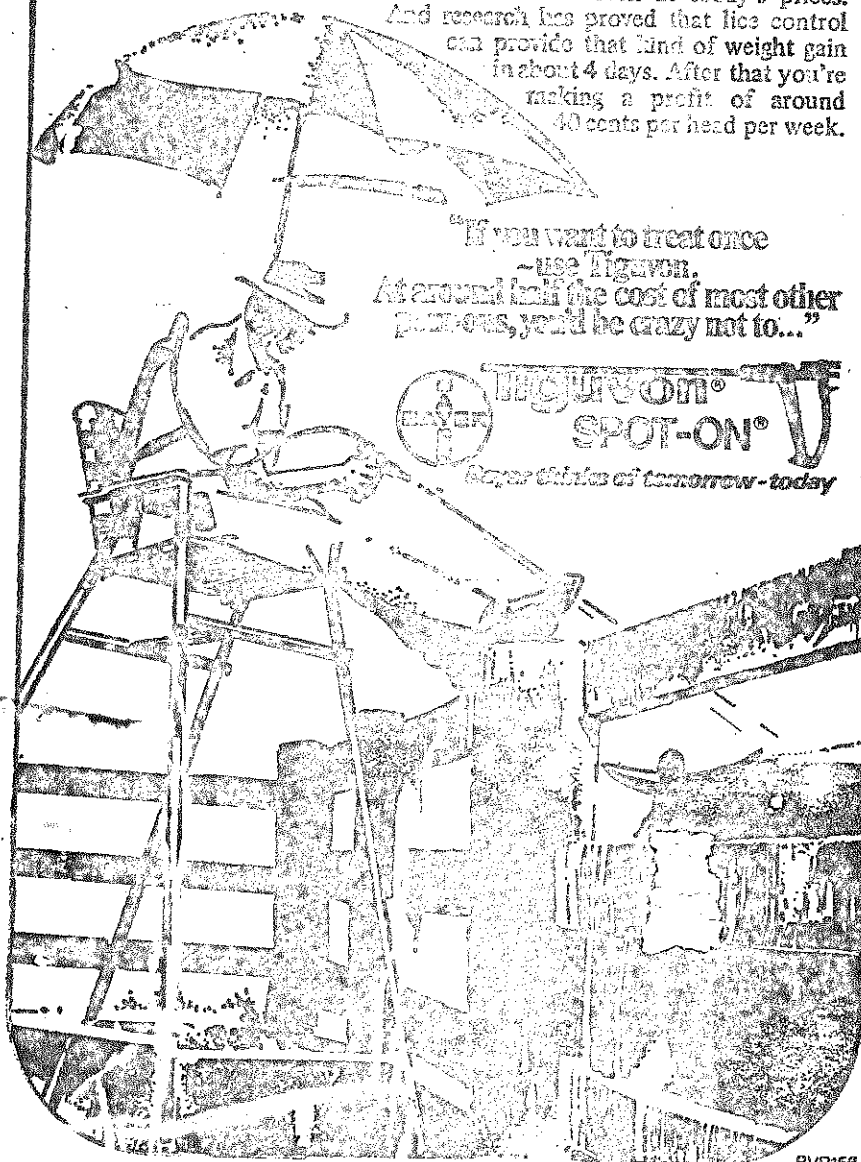
