HERB CRAFT PART 2 BY Rita Summers

Growing Herbs;

In these days of organic gardening, the idea of "fighting" with herbs is most interesting Used sensibly, herbs can make insecticides and other chemicals a thing of the past in your garden. Following is a list of a few herbs, and the insects they deter; plant wherever the pests occur.

MINT; Ants and beetle.

CHIVES: Aphis.

LAVENDER; Moths

BASIL: Flies

EEGANO: Cucumber beetle (plant near cucumber)

AMONILE: Mosquitoes

FENNEL: Fleas

HYSSOP OR SAGE: Cabbage moths (similarly plant

near cabbage)

TANSY: Ants

GARLIC: One of the most useful of all. This king of pest battlers can kill flies, fruitflies, mosquitoes and many others.

Apart from utilizing the actual growing plant sprays and other compounds can be made from


them. Here are some suggestions. 1. In fruit trees soak a piece of cloth with garlic juice; put in tin, which is placed

in the tree. 2. Make mixture for spraying from ground,

garlic, ground onion and pepper in water. 3. Plant garlic cloves around the tree, close

to the trunk.

4. To keep aphids from roses: make a spray of green onion juice and chopped chives, and water in equal quantities.



YESTER YEAR

Extract from the Examiner - April 1929. STORMS & FLOOD AT ST. MARYS.

Following the heavy rain on Show Day at St. Marys, the rain continued till Friday morning. Eighteen inches (450m) fell causing extensive floods.

Members of the Midland Hunt Club who were at the St. Marys Show Wednesday intended having their opening run on Thursday, but it had to be cancelled, and their horses put on the train. Before they could get away, word came through that the railway line was unsafe, so the horses had to be unloaded, and returned to stables till Sunday morning, when they left by road for Avoca.

His Excellency the Governor, Sir James O'Grady left by the first train on Thursday morning and got through before the flood closed the railway. Early on Thursday right all communication was cut off, landslides blocked St. Marys Pass. The main road to Fingal was impassable, and the East coast road via Bicheno was also closed.

Telephone and telegraph were cut by falling trees, everywhere except to Mt. Nicholas.

On Friday afternoon the rain slackened, and the flood became less, and then the extent of the damage began to be known. News of the Derby clamity was received by wireless and caused a sadness in the town.

Railway repairers got through to Fingal with a trolley and brought back the mail that could not be brought to St. Marys on Thursday night. It had been left on Fingal station overnight, and the flood water gave it such a soaking that it had to be dried, before it could be delivered. Shameful scars left Another mail was received on Saturday afternoon, when all the news papers were snapped up for authentic news. No mail left st. Marys from Thursday morning till steep hillside, who Saturday morning, when one was got through, aglow with colour. though the service bus did not get beyond Each year it seems avoca.

The Pass road was cleared sufficiently to enable cars to pass to Scamander and Upper Scamander where supplies were much needed. A few sight seers made the trip to see the wrecked bridge. All the roads that were under water have been badly damaged, and many fences destroyed and some stock drowned.

The coal mines have not worked since Thursday and there will not be much doing at any of them till trucks can be conveyed on the St. Marys - Conara railway. There were many visitors in the town when the storm broke, and the cutting of communication caused some people anxiety.

Picture patrons were not cotered for, as usual on Saturday night, as Mr. Hales programme could not get *hrough. A dance was held instead.

On Saturday night 3LO gave news of the sad plight of a section of Launceston, owing to flood waters, and information of damage in other parts of the State.

Sunday was bright and clear with a strong westerly breeze which was rapidly drying the roads. The rivers and creeks being nearly normal again.
