Whites played a much better game, than they played in the first semi-final, and had an easy win over All Blacks with final scores being 38 - 24.





I litre (2 pts) rose petals 0.5 " (I pt.) rose geranium leaves " lavendar flowers.

I cup of rosemary needles.

2 tbspns each ground cloves, cinnamon, allspice.

3 tbspns. each crushed orris root & powdered gum benzion.

20 drops essential oil of rose.

11 11 of sandalwood or citrus. For the last 2 ingredients, the Indian oils now selling as perfumes would be suitable.

HERBAL POT- POURRI, Leaves : choose from basil, bay, rose geranium, bergamot, lemon balm, thyme, mayoram, mint, rosemary, sage, tarragon, Flowers: choose from, borage, eucalyptus. camomile, elder, lavender, lime, cowslip, clover, marigalds, nasturtiums, rose petals, violets. Spices: Choose from cardemon, cinnamon, cloves, nutmeg, citrus peel, coriander. General:

Add oils to flowers and fixtures, then put flowers, leaves, and spices in layers in the container. Use small whole flowers and leaves to decorate the top layer. Place airtight container for six weeks.
