Pollution is unwise use of resources, so conservation is wise use of resources. What we have to think out and decide is; what sort of pollution we want, as we are going to get some sort, there are too many people not to leave a mess, so a discussion is necessary about our resources. What can be done about our wildlife for instance? The best and surest way to kill off a species is to destroy its hatitat, quite a lot of animals and plants become extint if this is done. The surest way to conserve species is to make them earn money. Australian fauna is not so spectacular or so easy to see as some in other parts of the world; but its every bit as varied, and on a world scale, far more unusual. With proper promotion and imaginative national parks, our wild life could become a great asset to the country.

So using resources wisely means in general that a resource should be exploited in the manner that does the least amount of damage to the long term survival and renewal of that resource. The best idea of course is multiple use. A road can be a long strip of bitumen with long grass for 20 yards on each side and a fence, this is quite a good road, but thats all its good for.; or you could have a road in the middle of a strip 200 yards wide with the natural vegetation left intact on each side, you then have not only a road, but a nature reserve, a place for recreation and also a far more shady and pleasant road to drive on. This is also a sound idea as trees bind the soil, the end result is less

wind and water erosion, better soil conservation and preservation of wild life, also the creeks and rivers are not so silted up.


What we have to consider is-how to reduce pollution to the minimum is it going to do any good say to ban non-returnable containers?

Well this will prevent the roadsides from having tins and bottles thrown there, BUT this will mean that there will be water pollution to wash the containers, more air pollution from vehicles which collect the empty containers to return to the factories.

To control pollution is going to be expensive. If we are going to demand cars that make less carbon monoxide, or rivers that are free of noxious effluents, or soaps that are bio-degradable, or containers which are reuseable, its going to cost money to do this, yet it should not cost us much as we have been led to believe. In fact it costs more, a lot more to have pollution, if this money could be used for prevention instead of repairing the damage it would not cost so much, in Britain for instance air pollution costs \$250 million a year.

The following is an example of a grade 4 work on pollution, this copy was written by Claire Richardson.

Mostly over Tasmania and Australia there is pollution. Over in Tokyo they have special machines to breath from. The factories that put their leftovers in the water are paint, paper, and Zinc works, pollution can be very dangerous in the air. It can join together and make, big clouds of it which we cannot breath. The air is not clean it has little bits of dirt in it. Most factories should have machines that let the pollution go that instead of into the water or air. Over in Melbourne they had a strike with rubbish men and all the rubbish was piled everywhere. In the Derwent River there is a sewerage problem so the Government is spending over \$1,000,000 to stop the pollution. In the Derwent also is the oil that comes from the tanker Lake Illawarra that sank when it hit the Tasman Bridge. People are very careless and leave their bottles, cans and icecream papers around to help this service stations have rubbish bins for all bottles to recycle them.





"JUST YARNIN"

Thought you might like to hear something about the life of that well known Mangana identity "Major" Eric Eberhardt. He must have been playing hard to catch for a long time now as he's still a handsome batchelor with the slim straight figure of a lad, and yet he says he is 74 come October.... hard to believe! Phillip Eberhardt, Eric's grandfather came here from Germany and settled in Campbell Town; he had 9 children, Charlie being the eldest, and also the father of Eric. Work was harder to come by in those days than nov, but also very ill-paid when found, and this is why Charlie had to move his family about so often; first he worked on farms round the Campbell Town district drawing £1 per week and double rations for his family of 3. Then after a while they moved to a house in Avoca and Charlie worked at the Rex Hill mine. On Sunday afternoons the family often took a walk along the Royal George road with their young son Eric, so one afternoon when the boy could not find his Mother he walked along that road himself looking for her, but he got lost, and as it became dark he crawled into a hollow tree near the road. Only being 4 years old the little chap cried with fear, and this was fortunate for Jo Priest and Edgar Freeman who happened to be going out to set their rabbit traps heard Eric's wails and took him back to his anxious parents where he was restored with hot milk. The next move was to the mine at Waratah for 2 or 3 years, and thenback to Avoca and the kex Hill mine again. In 1910 bad times came and the Eberhardts moved to the bush 4 miles South of Avoca while poor Charlie looked for another job. Finally he decided to fossick for tin and wolfram near Gipp's Creek, and the family, which of course had increased by this time shifted there. this stage Eric went to stay with his grandparents at Campbell Town for 6 months to get the only schooling he was able to have, this as much as anything shows how different things were then. The family then moved to a small farm near the old Repulic Mine, the other side of Itossarden. This must have been a relief for Mrs. Eberhardt as they had a cow, ran a few sheep, and she could grow vegetables; she also used to help the larder by shooting birds and rabbits whit her husbands 410 shotgun when necessary.
