Book Review by the "Orphan's Granddaughter"

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

A book which I have had in my possession for some time; and one which invariably draws me back to its pages time and time again is "Silent Spring" by Rachel Carson. Miss Carson took a degree in biology in 1929, she also did graduate work in genetics and in 1936-52 she was Editor-in-Chief for the United States Fish and Wildlife service. Miss Carson also did research work at the Marine Biological Laboratory in Massachusetts. She achieved many rewards in her lifetime including the gold medal of New York Zoological society and the National Wild life federation.

"Silent Spring" is the story of the use of toxic chemicals in the countryside and their widespread destruction of wildlife (caused by pesticides, fungicides, and herbicides) it is a frightening book, a factual book and one which every thinking person should read, whether they are home gardeners, farmers, forestry workers, or agricultural workers. It is food for thought in this technological age where we take for granted the multitude of bottled and tinned poisonous substances available to control the pests in our gardens and on our farms. A follow up book to "Silent Spring" namely "Since Silent Spring" was written after the death of Miss Carson, it too, is well worth reading and digesting!

Rachel Carson wrote "Silent Spring" Court and legal action big business did bring. But her name was cleared, her facts were true,

those trying to discredit her could not sue, Miss Carson writes of dangers we all should be aware,

in chemical pesticides, insecticides, there is need for more care.

So before you grab that dangerous spray, to lace your garden and farm, think? is there some other way?

short term expediency to kill off those bugs, is it worth it? to poison the earth for the sake of a few slugs?

with Dieldrin, Aldrin, D.D.T. Mercury and such, Is enough care taken, do we care all that much?

What we do to nature in turn rebounds on our lives, for soil is not an inert thing, it is loaded with plants and minute creatures we need to survive.

To all who scoff at the above and dismiss it with scorn,

Get this book, read it, digest it and then like me you'll reform!!

Dear Sir,

It is noted that there is to be a by election for the St. Marys Ward of the Council. I wonder what attention Cornwall will get? Cornwall is rapidly assuming a position of the forgotten country township. Blackberries, bush, and high grass are everywhere, and un made roads, empty blocks which must belong to the council, on council ground. A fair percentage of houses in Cornwall are occupied by one person usually an elderly female, and it is beyond their physical capabilities to tackle these problems. We have drains, which are not drains, its just the easiest place for the water to go. These drains are full of stones, wood and weeds, heaven help us when the heavy rains come-floods again?

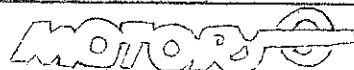

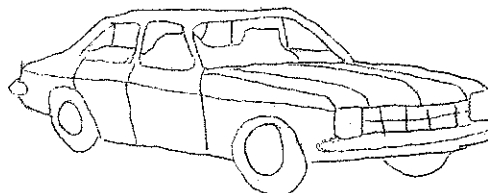

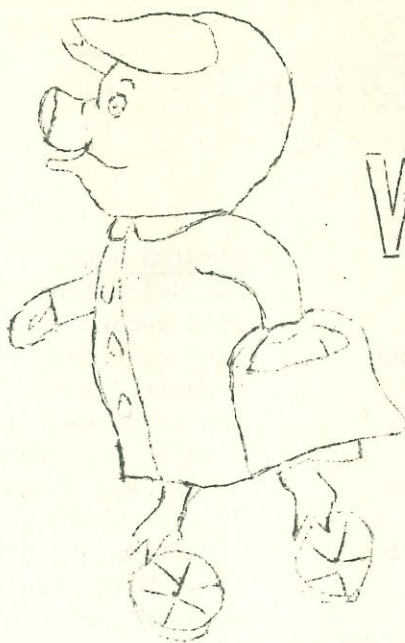
