EDITORIAL

"Education for all of Life " was the theme chosen by Christian women of Latin America for the recent Women's World Day of Prayer.

What does "education " mean to you ? Is it the dictionary translation - "the process of training and developing the knowledge, skill, mind, character etc., especially by formal schooling, teaching, training." It is a boring, over-emphasized topic in society today ? Is it something for teachers and the like and not for "ordinary" people ? Is it something our children must have whether we approve or not ? Or is it a vital part of living ?

"Education means an awakening of the consciousness and of the conscience. It is important to use our knowledge towards improving life around us and endeavour to make it a more comfortable place in which to live." (This quotation is from the Northern President of Womens World Day of Prayer committee.)

The service was thought provoking and enriching and certainly challenging to all fortunate enough to attend. Education involves everyone. From the moment of birth through to death we never stop learning. We all need educating both physically and spiritually. All too often our attitude is, "Let God handle the spiritual side of it and we'll deal with the physical side." This is wrong! God is involved in both aspects and so must we. Unfortunately most of us can't successfully deal with education. For so we use our mind, character and acquired knowledge and

skill to the best advantage to ourselves and others and for the benefit of our environment ? So many of the world's population is illiterate. Just how fortunate are we that this rarely occurs in our community. Does education really achieve anything in this district ? Look around our community and what do you see ? Apathy ! Teenages with nothing better to do than roam the streets. Old people living alone - so lonely because "friends" and relatives can't be bothered visiting them. Litter, overgrown vacant blocks, rivers choked with debris, unpainted, unkept buildings. The more we look the more we see. There are also industrious people, caring for others and the environment - making use of their education.

Open your eyes and really listen - what do you hear ? (On life in general)
"I'm bored ! There's nothing worth watching on telly and the footy season hasn't started yet."

"This town's dead ! wish I lived somewhere else." or "How lucky we are to live here. Look at the beauty around us. Let us make our towns live. Let's do something. Let's get involved."

ON PHYSICAL EDUCATION

"Schools great - I'm glad the holidays are over." "It's good to see the young ones have the chances we never had."

Not all view education in this light. There are a minority of the older generation envious of the availability of good education to the youngest today - Resentful that they could not have learnt more. There is the child who must endure "mental torture" for 5 days

a week within the confinments of school. There are the teachers faced with the problem of teaching the "backward "child in a class of intellegent, enthusiastic students.

Do you wish to improve your education - Learning new skills, sharing your existing knowledge with others? You can ! In this months issue of the A.A.P's (Australian Assistance Plan) Magazine there is an article on " Learning Exchange." In 1973 a "School Without Walls" was established in Canberra for school age students who could not study successfully under restrictions and disipline of a normal school. It has been highly successful and the idea has snowballed. It now extends to all age groups. So many people would like to learn more we are isolated from night schools etc. but that does not inhibit our learning. An exchange school can be started here. Our children can't leave s school to attend this but they, along with us can participate of an evening or in fact anytime. There is a extract from the A.A.P Mag. outlining the exchange programme.

"A learning exchange is an alternative education scheme where people of all ages can join together to share their skills and knowledge— It may be a school, an office or even under a in the bush—— It provider an enviroment where people are able to share their knowledge through learning and teaching. The exchange enables the resources of a community - its knowledge, skills, sources of equipment, energy - to become known and readily available to everyone who wishes to use them."

This could be the start of "Education - for all of Life " within our community. By applying this type of physical education we have already started to improve our spiritual education for to care is to love and " God is Love ".

FROM THE PULPIT

It's Lent again. Christians observe this season of prayer and penance each year in the spirit of our Lord's forty-day fast and struggle with Satan in the desert, Self-discipline, fasting, abstaining from customary pleasures in diet and entertainment, doing works of charity, effort to overcome personal vices - all these practices are going on unseen and unparaded as we prepare to share with Christ His death and rising again.
