EDITORIAL :

Next Sunday, 25th April, will be the 61st anniversary of Amzac Day. On that date in 1915, men of the Australian and New Zealand Army Corps went ashore on the beaches of the Gallipoli Peninsular. The campaign was a military disaster. The combined British forces lost II5,000 men killed or wounded, the French 47,000 while our Turkish enemy estimated their total casualties at 350,000. The eventual evacuation of the Allied forces has only been equalled by that at Dunkirk in May 1940. The official history of World War one rends "Though the expeditionary forces of the two Dominions were only in their infancy, and afterwards fought with success in greater battles, no campaign was so identified with them as this. In no unreal sense it was on the 25th of April 1915 that the consciousness of Australian nationhood was born." And from this concept came the vision of an Anzac Commemeration Day.

It is necessary to understand just what this day means to the ex- servicemen - it is not a glorification of war, but a day of remembrance and reunion. Throughout both countries the presence of men and women at the various cenotaphs and war memorials is a symbolic visit to the graves of the fallen, scattered throughout the

lands and oceans of the world.

Because of this, it is a day which is observed by their relatives, their widows and their children. Therefore it is a day which could be and should be observed by people of all ages and not just ex- servicemen. Today, we have in our community, citizens who are not Australians by birth but we invite them to share the day with us for many of them have their own memories of war and their own National days in which they can no longer take part. Also, in the Australian community today we have a population half of which are under 29 years and one third are under 16. "None can speak more eloquently of peace than those who have known the tragedy of war," and we who have known war would like to pass on this message to those who have not. Anzac Day provides this opport unity. This day, we remember the wounded, the sick and the maimed, all those who suffer from war, Many carry secret wounds, wounds of the mind which are not outwardly visible - no man woman, or child can experience war and not be effected in some way. The ex- servicemen will be remembering the bad times and the good times - we have memories of battle, of bombing and of monotony. We will recall the inspiring voice of Winston Churchill, the voice of the Traitor, Joyce, from Berlin, calling us "rats" and that of Tokyo Rose. We remember visiting other lands and meeting people of many races. All these memories are so deeply impressed on our sub- conscious

minds that it takes little to bring them back, often at the most unexpected times. Sometimes it is a particular word or phrase, a place name or even a song when suddenly, the present surroundings or company just fade and you are back in the past. No doubt, many readers have experienced this. So, to us, Anzac Day is a day of remembrance and will be as long as we live. We shall continue to observe this day on every succeeding 25th of April no matter what alterations may be suggested or made to this day by other people. We would plead with those in authority not to lower the significance of Anzac Day by making it just " another long weekend". We gather together on Anzac Day to remember that over IOO,000 Australians have died for their country. Over 2,000 years ago, a Greek called Pericles wrote these words, "They gave their lives. For that public gift, they received a praise that never ages and a tomb most glorious not so much the tomb in whish they lie, but that in which their fame survives, to be remembered forever when occasion comes for word or deed ".

Do not let us forget this day of remembrance, the tomb in which our Anzacs lie.



CORNWALL COAL COMPANY TO REOPEN CORNWALL SOON;

Mr A.B. Lohrey M.H.A. said he had received this information from Mr.J.G.Symonds mining Director in response to a letter concerning the danger of underground fires at the mine. The Senior Engineer Mr.H.Murchie investigated the matter and reported that the underground fire was sealed off 20 years ago and that there in no evidence to suggest that any hazard exists from that source. However an illegal grass fire 3 years ago set fire to material dumped on the hill side and set fire to the mine. 


