It was quite a night with the boys at the pub last night, round after round, and when you left you were nicely primed, you knew you could drive O.K. you were very high as you took to the wheel. You did wish though that oncoming drivers would keep to their own side of the road. Whoops! that was close. What's the matter with that chap coming straight at me. Phew! that was close, he must have had one too many, fair turned your stomach that did. Ah well soon be home now. ANNUAL MEETING FINGAL VALLEY WELFARE

COMMITTEE, on MARCH 15th. at

PRESBYTERIAN HALL, FINGAL

The warden of Fingal Councilor F.C. Hass chaired the meeting and in his address he said how impressed he was at hearing the three club reports of their activities over the year. One thing he would like to mention was the help given by young people who came forward to help the club and committee along. He was impressed by these young people carrying out this work and what it does for the Municipality. Elderly people appreciate and look forward to gathering together, which the club makes possible. All help in this direction was to be encouraged because the senior citizens of today made this Municipality what it is now. They were the backbone of the Municipality.

The guest speaker Rev. K.C. Ogier of Launceston commenced his address by pointing out that all of us were aging and should be conscious of it, even if we don't admit it! Problems face us when they are acute and some of them are best met in groups (like in these clubs) and achieve things together. Personal dignity to old people is still important. "Do not, he said, lose your dignity!" Old people are still human beings and should not be put aside. They want independence and they really have a right to stay in their own homes if they want to. Decisions should be made by themselves. They need security, which we must pay attention to: to see that they are safe, have companionship as loneliness is often the lot of old people, especially for the one who is left after bereavement.

Retiring : This is a difficult period in life and only a great deal of friendship can get a retiring person over a difficult period. In retiring from normal work, boredom can be common. Idle hands leads to boredom and the easiest way to destroy old people is to do everything for them. This is a mistake. We have to cope with growing old and the mind reaches maturity at 60 but there is still scope for using powers which have increased over the years.

Mr. Ogier said although this was a Meeting of mixed opinion he could not pass up the opportunity to point out the tremendous resource there is in Faith, Cont. Page 6.

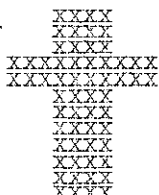

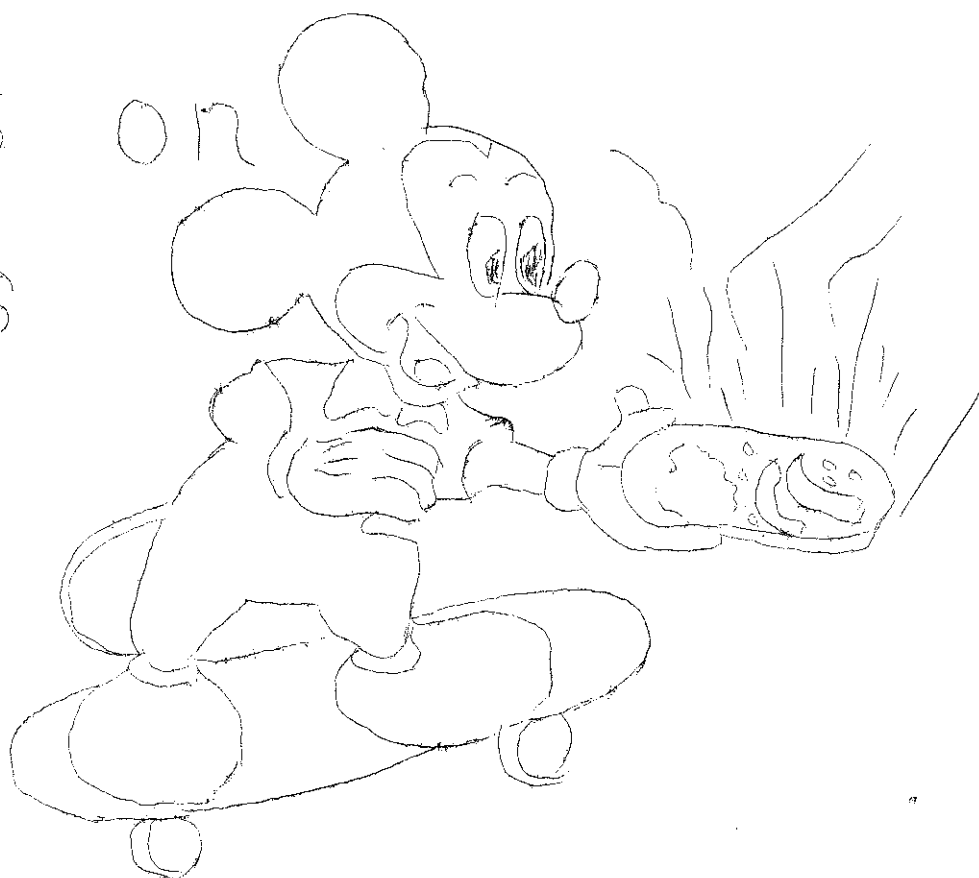

All sorts of things happen to people and they would be foolish to neglect this resource which can be called on in times of stress.
