MEDIBANK

Blight or blessing? This depends not only on your political views but on your locality as well.

Australians generally are evenly divided on the matter, much in line with political divisions. Few have bothered themselves with the finer detail and have classified it either as a welcome extension of welfare benefits or another costly socialist intrusion on the Australian way of life.

Extended welfare benefits becomes a matter of robbing Peter to pay Paul. Benefits to one are added taxes to another with the extra burden of an enlarged Public Service bureaucracy in the middle. One often hears producers and socialists, among others bleating about the middle man. There is a most expensive middle man, no doubt for every \$1 in benefits paid we will pay \$2 in taxes. As for being "free", we will be paying in taxes about the same as paid in contributions to private health insurance funds before.

The problem is that we will get less cover. Private hospital fees of up to \$60 per day will attract only \$16 per day refund from Medibank. This means that without extra private insurance private hospital patients could face extra costs of up to \$300 per week.

On the other hand, the private health insurance funds are quick to point out the deficiencies of Medibank, but are

ST MARYS BAKERY most reluctant to provide that cover now needed. Who needs insurance for spare legs or glass eyes? What should be provided is simple hospital insurance at a reasonable price. But this does not appear to be forthcoming. Maybe non-acceptance of the "new deal" offered by these firms will see them bow to people's wishes.

But all is not gloom.
Locally we stand to gain considerably. It appears that benevolent Medibank will pay the costs of a District Medical Officer. Previously this would have been a rate burden on all, particularly pensioners who would not normally have paid for medical attention. A D.M.O. has been promised for Fingal. With the departure of the private practitioner from St. Marys surely this is the time for a D.M.O. at St. Marys, as well.

If that proves to be the case, Medibank will be a blessing indeed.

ANOTHER OPINION ...

Medibank is an unknown quantity to most of us, however to the average working man it is certain to be a welcome relief from the vice-like oppression of rising costs, particularly in the field of health care. The constant pressure of keeping up health insurance contributions will no longer hang ominously over the heads of those less "fortunate" persons who are battling to feed their families let alone fix them.

It is uncertain how taxes will be affected but one thing is certain, we have to pay taxes for any social benefits and it seem unfair that one section of the community receives special attention whilst the poorer side suffers, the load will be evenly distributed, with people contributing according to their earning capacity. Surely this is the fairest way?


