### TALKING POINT

#### Religion in schools;

Over recent months a rather serious controversy has been raging regarding the teaching of religion in schools. A great deal of pressure has been exerted on the Minister involved; Mr Batt to bring in compulsory religious instruction in our schools. He has wisely rejected such a move, and it appears as though religion will become an "optional" subject in Secondary Schools.

There is no doubt that the teaching of spiritual values and awareness would be of great benefit to all children. However, the teaching of one particular religious ideology. i.e. Christianity has several major drawbacks. Firstly to emphasise, the religion, places a distinction where there need be no distinction, it would tend to make the child aware of creed, similarly like teaching a child he was white and how good that was, extolling those virtues is liable to make a child racist. True spiritual instruction should ideally make a child more tolerant, understanding and loving, it should not encourage him to see himself as different from others because of his particular faith.

Second, unlike some of the major world religions, Christianity is a growing, changing religion, which has still to come clearly to terms with itself, of unity between the various Christian faiths and to rid itself of the dogma and bigotry that have haunted it's history.

Thirdly, the plain fact is, that we all have some basic belief which may vary greatly or slightly, but is different in almost every human being. Religion is one of those things that people have fought for, died for, argued endlessly over and which the wisest have pondered over, however the time is still to come when we can all gain such spiritual understanding that it may be taught correctly to children in schools. Fourth, what if the teacher is not a Christian? Would he be tempted to colour the lessons according to his own ideas or beliefs? What if the teacher is totally bigoted? Would he or she be tempted to pass on that bigotry whilst sincerely believing themselves right. True religion is taught by example, it is passed on by those who

### Stuffed Onions

Parboil 12 large mild onions for 8 minutes in salted water. Drain, scoop out the centres, leaving walls about  $\frac{1}{4}$  inch thick, and fill with the following mixture:  $\frac{1}{2}$  cup chopped centres of onions,

$\frac{1}{2}$  cup cooked and diced meat,  
1 cup cooked and diced potatoes.  
chopped sage leaves,  
salt and pepper.

Fill the hollows in the onions and arrange in a baking dish, brush onions with melted butter, sprinkle over with bread crumbs, dot with butter and bake in a moderate oven about 35mins. If you

Eric aged 14 and already working on outside duties at the mine thought he was old enough to help his Ma with the shooting so used to go out with the gun and his brother Doug when his father was not in. However it was noticed that the cartridges were getting scarce, and Mr Eberhardt suspected the boys, so he put some blue paint on them, Eric all unsuspecting took cartridges from the bag and popped them in his pocket, but when he returned with nice wattle birds for a Sunday pie, he was caught with the evidence upon his clothes and had to stand in the corner while the others had their supper and he got none.

About 1925 the family made their final move this time to Mangana where Charlie got work with the Council, Eric went to the mine at Rossarden where he earned a whole \$7 per fortnight, this was in the early days of the mine when the shaft was only about 20' deep; in the weekends he usually stayed on to help carpenters build more cottages for the workers.

During World War two Eric joined up, being stationed at Broome in W.A. where the men had a rather dull time waiting for the Japanese to arrive. After the war he returned to Mangana working for the Council till he retired recently. Now in his spare moments Eric scratches for gold in the nearby gullies, or walks up the Ben when the opportunity occurs.

The match to be played at Campbell Town on Sunday is the third round of this State wide competition, and our association is the only country association left in the fight for the \$10,000 prize.

New Norfolk, coached by state coach and living legend, Darrel Baldock, have won only two matches this season, one of them being last Monday against highly rated North Hobart.

The pressure will be applied to them as our boys aim to back up the claim as being the top country competition in the state.

In the first round of the cup, when we easily defeated the N.E.F.U. we had many fine players - Terry and
