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### EDITORIAL

The right to free speech is the prerogative of everyone, each one of us in our society has the opportunity to utter his or her beliefs, and the truth as they see it. We may not wish to give utterance to all we think, but we are not forced to say anything we do not think or sincerely believe. This is the essential difference between freedom and domination through fear, such as exists in dictatorship ruled countries.

A recent black ban by the transport union on Dr. Gill is an example of encroachment on an individual's liberty to speak out for what he thinks is right. There are subtle and not so subtle forces at work in our community to "gag" people from speaking as their conscience dictates.

Teachers and politicians are expected to do their work without criticism of the party or the system. It would be interesting to note how many changes for the better there would be, should honest justified criticism become a practice in our working lives, particularly if that criticism is constructive.

How many transport workers for instance would be game to say they voted Liberal instead of Labour in the last Bass by election for fear of being branded a "traitor" by their workmates?

Was it a "fair go" that Mr Begent has been inundated with objectionable letters and phone calls because he chose to walk a

different political road from the expected?

It is not easy to stand up and be counted for what we believe in, it is so easy to be carelessly branded a "stirrer" by others with little or no regard given to the strong beliefs motivating such an outcry. Many would rather be silent than speak out; for reasons which, when analysed seem incredibly stupid. Reasoning such as "what will so and so, or the neighbours think" leaves us as a society and nation wide open to be ground down and trampled on without so much as a murmur! Another attitude equally to be condemned is the "what's the use of complaining what can I do?" attitude. Such a complacent "she'll be right" stand for everything and every situation is dangerous. If we take chipping away of our individual rights, if we take injustice, meekly accepting it without speaking out - then we deserve all we get.

Irrespective of our culture, race, religion, or politics everyone has the right to be heard without fear of reprisal, or ridicule; one example of the latter was the Launceston teacher who was told by Mr Whitlam our Prime Minister "You are a disgrace to your profession"

Right or wrong though we may be, it is our inalienable right as individuals in a democratic society, to speak out loudly and clearly for what we believe is right. Over the years people have voiced their thoughts many of which have become great actions, some have paid dearly for their stand, we should not judge too harshly those opinions expressed by others which do not mirror our own. Unless we understand what motivates a sincere utterance and action, it is unfair to hang a label around someone's neck and dismiss them as an annoying, irrelevant or insignificant part of our society.

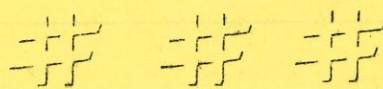

# ST MARYS HOSPITAL? CLASSIFIEDS

The Minister for Health, the Hon.H.Farquhar M.H.A. dropped a bomb-shell at a special meeting of the St.Marys Public Hospitals Board on Wednesday 25th June when he announced that control of both St.Marys and St.Helens Hospitals would be taken from the board and vested in the Board of the Launceston General Hospital. He stated that he would appoint local house committees to each hospital but was unable to define the powers of these bodies. The Minister advised that his proposed action was part of the Regionalisation program and that he expected that some economies would result. No other district hospitals in Tasmania were likely to be similarly affected in the near future. Board members told the Minister that they were shocked by his decision which was taken without any prior advice or consultation with them. They could not see where any savings would result, but rather the reverse. The Board Chairman, Mr.G.H.Napier, expressed the hope that local residents from both St.Marys and St. Helens would support the Board in their efforts to retain control in the area. He hoped that interested people would contact members of the Board and express their opinions on this matter.

I do apologise to readers for the absence of this column in the last issue of the Valley Voice, however, we will endeavour to ensure that we don't neglect any future issues of the column.

I desire to bring to the notice of all motor vehicle owners and to all drivers, that registrations and licences are only valid for one year from the date of issue.

Some readers will no doubt remark that this is well known, and that there is little need for me to make mention of the fact, but irrespective I feel it is important that I do so, for too frequently we find that drivers call at our station to renew their licence and an inspection of the licence presented reveals that it expired several months prior.

This also has been found with some renewal of registrations, so you can see why I mention this matter. It's one thing not to be caught unlicensed or unregistered, but should you be unfortunate enough to get yourself involved in an accident, then not only will you suffer prosecution, but you also will be out of pocket for the repairs to your vehicle, and most likely to the other persons vehicle as well.

Check up on your registration and your licence just to make sure that they are in order. It won't do any harm.

Giving away our hospital would only be one step. What would be taken next, our free ambulance? our dental service? We must make our voices heard to prevent this first step in the robbery and centralisation of all rural administrations.

# FISHING NOTES

Scamander Angling Club held its annual meeting and dinner last Saturday night at the Scamander Hotel-Motel. Seventy eight members and their wives attended the function. All retiring office bearers were re-elected unopposed- these are; Patron D.E.C.Scott, President G.R.Gadsby, Vice-President G.A.Luck, Secretary A.R.Jackson, Treasurer W.J.Stone, Committee H.Gratzer, C.Brown and F.Hayes. After the dinner, the annual trophies were presented, followed by dancing. Hereunder is the annual report given by the Secretary.

"The Club has experienced yet another successful year and membership stands at 105 including 33 ladies. This is an increase of 9 over last year.

During the year, twelve contests were conducted, i.e. one per month. Entries totalled 339, giving an average of 28 per contest. The weather has a marked influence on these figures and entries ranged from 13 on 27th April to 47 on 3rd November. No contests were cancelled this year. A total of 50 trophies have been presented, not including those to be awarded tonight at the annual dinner. Overall catches were disappointing, but there were some highlights, particularly the 5 lb 1 oz black-back landed by Syd Sutton in the last contest. This is the heaviest salmon weighed in since the club was re-activated in 1971. I should like to suggest that Syd should be granted a suitable title, such as Club Champion, until such time as another angler better that weight.

The Committee are grateful for the support given by members and their friends at the contests and also to those people who have generously donated trophies during the season.

Your Club was represented in a deputation to the Minister for Fisheries regarding commercial netting and requested that certain waters be reserved for amateur fisherman. This was turned down, but further efforts will be made in conjunction with Game Fishing Clubs. The Committee look forward to another happy year and the first event will be at Wrinklers on 20th July."

# RED CROSS

## MEDIBANK

The local Branch of Red Cross will be holding their Annual Meeting on Monday nights in the Institute at 7.30 p.m. The public is urged to support this organisation by their attendance at this meeting.

As you are, no doubt, all aware of the wonderful work that Red Cross does throughout the world. I only need point out a couple of their works. Its presence in war zones and disaster areas has made the life of many a person much more comfortable. Also with the running of Bloodbanks, the visiting of the sick, the providing of much needed books for hospital patients, and I can go on, no matter where we are or what we do, more than likely the works of Red Cross can be seen. The sign of the Red Cross on the white background is regarded throughout the world as a sign of help and comfort.

Here in St. Marys a small group works hard all year round to provide the community with a free Ambulance service. Most of the money raised is from the annual Red Cross door knock in March. The local group also provides a library service at the hospital, and assists with the local blood bank every three months.

I am sure that all of us, as members of the wider community congratulate the local Branch of Red Cross for the marvellous contribution they make to the communities welfare.

I urge all members of the community to show Red Cross that you are pleased with what they are doing by attending their Annual Meeting on Monday night.

Mr Jack Spilsbury, the local secretary, has provided us with the following report on the Red Cross Ambulance Service.

### ST. MARYS RED CROSS AMBULANCE

This project started in 1947. The aim being to give a free Ambulance Service to the people. Our Present Ambulance has been in service since November 1969 and to date has done over 61,500 miles. This financial year has been used on 69 occasions for a mileage of 8101 miles (an average of 117 miles per trip).

Garage costs for the year were \$658.76  
Driving costs 388.24  
Total 1047.00  
= 12.92 cents per mile

What do you do about it? Well this is what our reporter found out. Each person will or has been sent a card with your number on it, but don't worry if your card hasn't come yet, it will.

You can pay your doctor as you leave and fill in a claim form, to get a refund.

OR. It is not necessary to pay first your doctor then claim, you can send the bill to a Medibank agency and they will fix it all up for you. Alan Jackson the chemist in St. Marys has an agency and will help you fill out your form. And tell you what to expect in payment.

If you have to go to Hospital in Tasmania, and go to a public Hospital, and the usual wards. You will receive no bills for either hospital or doctor but as a private patient you will be entitled to medical benefits against their doctors fees and a subsidy by Aust. Government toward the cost of their accommodation in the hospital. If you are a pensioner, Medibank will replace the present Service(P.M.S.) doctors will be asked to bill Medibank direct for all treatments of P.M.S. people. Thus if you have to see a specialist this will also be paid.

### SEA FOOD SALAD

Cook 2 cups of long-grain rice in plenty of salted water, till the grains are fluffy and plump. Wash with cold water to separate the grains and put aside to cool and drain. When cold place in a bowl and add the following;

a small tin of crabmeat chunks, 1 red and 1 green pepper chopped, a little sliced celery several good sized leaves of dill chopped, and toss with  $\frac{1}{4}$  cup of good mayonaise to which salt and  $\frac{1}{2}$  tablespoon of lemon juice have been added. Chill well before serving and garnish with fresh dill leaves.

Our main source of income is by our Annual Doorknock in March. This year the Appeal totalled \$1478.33. Since the inception of the project we have had four ambulances.

1) A Red Cross Amulance on loan from 1947, until we get our first a Dodge Ambulance in 1947 - In 1957 we purchased a Ford Ambulance which we used in NOV. 1969 -during approx. 77,000 miles.



Henry King came from England with his Irish wife to Tasmania over 150 years ago. At one time they farmed at what is known as Irish Town owing to Mrs King and a couple of other Irish settlers being the life and soul of the place; and they lived up <sup>under</sup> above that beautiful waterfall.

Of the King's children, one son John Horace returned to that tight valley near St. Patricks Head to farm near where he had been born. A couple of miles up from the coast Four Mile Creek divides into two streams, the left arm flowing through Anderson's gulley, and in this lovely sheltered valley John and Barbara King farmed for some years. In the rich alluvial soil strawberries, raspberries, cherries, and apples grew abundantly and cattle and sheep also prospered. However the sun sets early in such places and after two severe bouts of pneumonia John had to move to higher land. The Doctor rode down from St. Marys to visit the sick man, and Mr King had to carry all the furniture up to the road on his back as no vehicle could be used there.

The family moved to a farm named "Woodvale" at Irish Town where they brought up their family of 10 children. There was a well-built school with the teachers house under the same roof—Miss Blackett was the first to hold the post, and then came Miss Cunningham, and there were usually about 18 children attending school.

Irish Town was not a town at all, just a district made up of a number of small farms, most of which housed large families. There were the Herses, Kings, Connells, Reilleys, Mitchells and nearer to St. Patrick's head the Currans, who still own their own farm there.

In that isolated area each home was on cleared land among the great gum trees, and in each, great activity took place; bread was baked outside in brick ovens, cows had to be milked twice daily, cheeses were made on most farms, the land tilled and crops sown and harvested as is usual, but was a real community with all the men lending a hand as the heavy tasks came due. Thus with help from youngsters and neighbours all work was managed without any hired help at all.

When one farmer killed a beast all got a share, then it was another man's turn next.

Then there was the fun this group of neighbours made among themselves; an evening at King's house meant tables and chairs would be pushed against the walls in no time, out came Mr King's violin, Arthur or one of the girls played the piano and spirited dancing began,—what happy times they were, the laughter and music ringing through the valley, and young and old enjoying themselves till the small hours. How sad it is to visit this empty place now where tall chimneys stand with never a house to warm in one of the sweetest corners of Tasmania.

Few people care to live on small isolated farms these days, and the true community spirit seems lost in these affluent times.
