
#### OMEGA

This word is a common word in the press over the last few years. How many of us knows what the word means? or what it means in the context the press has been placing it recently. Omega, according to the Oxford dictionary is "Last letter of the Greek alphabet; last of a series; final development. The press use of the word'Omega'is dealing with navigational base, which is planned for somewhere in Australia; with every possibility of Tasmania being the point. What is Omega?

Omega is a radio navigation system capable of providing position fixing service on a world wide basis using a total of eight fixed transmitting stations. It is suitable for use by land vehicles, aircraft, surface ships and submarines; a significant feature being the ability to receive radio signals in the VFL band at aerial depths of up to 15-24 metres below the surface of the vater.

The latter feature has particular operational relevance to nuclear submarines, and is almost certainly one of the major considerations underlying the development of this system by the U.S. Navy.

This leads us to ask the question WHY SHOULD WE BE'A MUCLEAR TARGET.

#### WHY SHOULD WE BE A NUCLEAR TARGET?


As concerned Tasmanians, we view with alarm and dismay the possibility of our island becoming a nuclear target, because of the placement of a U.S. sponsered Omega base here. What will Omega mean?

It is reputed to be a civilian navigation aid, but it cannot be used within 440 miles (700KM) of the base site, making it useless to all shipping in Bass Strait our main shipping lene.

The majority report of the joint Parliamentary committee on vofeign affairs and defence dwells on Omega's doubtful civilian navigational benefits, yet ignores it as an important navigational aid for the U.S. Navy's submarine fleet, surface naval vessels, military aircraft and other nuclear weapons systems.

The U.S. navy's Omega project office stated in 1968 that "Omega is the only navigation method that is as well suited for submarines as for aircraft or surface vessels...a completely submerged submarine can be guided through any seas, the user does not reveal its position."

How do we know Omega is a nuclear target? Writing in International affairs (USSR) Y. Shvedkov said; "Naturally countries on whose territory the various installations associated with the use of nuclear missile weapons in general, and submarine missile carriers in particular are being built, would draw nuclear retaliation on to their territory." If you are concerned about your future and the future of your children as we are about ours, then let your parliamentarian know your concern. Gordon Salter promised that premises would be found somewhere. Three hours later two prospective premises were found. The T.A.B. officials were informed, the next day a meeting was held with Mr Barkly from the T.A.B. at St. Marys Within an hour the deal was clinched, the premises were suitable-St. Marys would get a full agency, Gordon Salters' face was total satisfaction.





#### Foreign Trees.

Trees are great travellers, to a limited extent they've got about the world by sea and wind propulsion, and also through the carrying capacity of birds. Ever since men used sails to cross oceans there are records of plants being brought from one country to another. in ancient Egypt pharachs imported rare flowers and trees from Asia, and in one beautiful wall painting there are a couple of Queen Hatshepsut's ships laden with myrr trees, incense, and monkeys in the land of Punt on the Somali coast. The trees were planted in a terraced garden on the West bank of the Nile below an ammense temple the Queen had ordered to be built in front of great cliffs.

More recently a wealthy amateur botanist, Sir Joseph Banks travelled to Australia with Captain Cook in 1770 where he collected many seeds and plants. Back in England these were carefully tended in the greenhouses in Sir Joseph's gardens near London; which he later left to the Nation, and are now famous as Kew Gardens. Many plants were gathered for Banks by interested collectors all over the world, and in the herbarium at Kew there are plants which are now extinct in the countries of their origin.

Last year when in Kathmandu we were delighted to see many Australian trees used for shade and decoration in the city streets. It would seem that an Australian Horticulturist had it was hard to judge the age of trees where the climate is so different with heavy monsoonal rains, and high summer temperatures; we found it quite warm, even in Autumn. The eucalyptus lining one street in the Western suburbs were very tall and well grown, the place obviously suited them, then there was a beautiful avenue of silky oaks, (grevillia robusta) near the present King's palace in Kanti Path. They are so high we grew stiff necks when watching myriads of crows flying back to nest in the high branches NEWSFLASH; one evening. The sleeping quarters were seemingly used up there on a roster basis for bats, hanging upside down peacefully snoozing which they do all day till darkness and hunting time arrives. Great flocks of crows coming in with a terrific din of Nepal-crow noises only momentarily distrubed the bats; who then drifted back to sleep till they were ready to move. Finally we had to leave before the bats did, as we could no longer see the tops of the trees in the gathering dusk, and our necks were so stiff. Tall Callstimon trees were bordering another busy street, their red brushes gleaming in the sun. In the mountains in Nepal rhododendrons are enormous trees instead of the shrubby things we grow here climate, soil, exposure to winds etc, make so many differences in growth habits.

#### GARDENING NOTES

Now is the time to build up the soil for all the spring growth, and if a well growing gardon is wantel , the soil must be well fed to produce this result. Are you near to a farm? or the bush? or beach? or an old sawmill? all these places produce good food for soils, the farmer may be glad to get rid of old hay, or let you clean out under his sheds, lovely manure comes from under sheds, and old hay soon rots down into good soil, the worms see to that, lay it all over the place you are going to put in a spring crop, water well and leave alone till about a month before you are ready to plant any weeds that have poked through will be rather spindly and easily pulled out, sprinkle with dolomite lime to sweeten the soil and blood and bone, if we have our usual winter rains the soil will be quite damp When ready to put in seeds under the hay. draw the hay apart and put the seeds into the soil, leave a little furrow with hay on each side till the seeds are showing then draw the hay nearer to keep weeds in check. Bush mulch gathered from the bush is very good for things that like acid soils such as azaleas and daphnes, also very successful with strawberries, tomatoes and potatoes; snails hate it, put around the plants about 6" deep it rots down The beach supplies you with lovely verv well. seaweed full of minerals and trace elements, bad for your car though, so put into containers, this is better dug in unless you have a compost bin where it just goes with other things, old been at work there some 20 years ago. However, sawdust is very good jeut spread around about 8" deep, it doesn't stay that deep as it rots down'quite well, if you can only get new saw dust.don't despair, spread the same as the old, put dolomite lime around and leave alone till you want to plant out in the spring; then just make a little hole down to the soil, always make the hole right through the material on top to the soil, then your plants will thank you by growing well.

## YOU STHE LAW

Any motorist travelling the East or Tasman Highways after dark, particularly at this time of year faces an unexpected hazard, that of straying stock, and I am'sure eve yine will agree with me, that a cow or horse can be a dangerous hazard on the road of a night, The last few weeks we have had 🔧 several accidents involving stock but at lanst, to date, we have had no serious injuries to drivers or passengers as result of these accidents. Nevertheless the accidents have been rather serious, and I also feel there has been some neglect on the part of the owners of the stock to take reasonable precautions to prevent their stock straying onto the

Of course I am the first to realise that farmers can only do so much in this direction, good fences along the road boundaries ăt times will not prevent a rouge steer or cow from getting out, but the farmer needs to keep a constant check on his stock to see that the opportunity of stock straying is restricted to an absolute minimum, and should there be a likelihood of a particular animal getting out onto the road, then this animal or animals should not be placed on land adjacent to the road.

The problem is one which I have had to look at very seriously due to number of instances where stock has been found to have strayed onto our streets or other public places. I want to inform stock owners, that stock straying on roads in the St. Marys district is far to prevalent and unless something constructive is done, in this direction to prevent stock from straying and from being a ' nuisance and a hazard to others, then I will be forced to impaand stock found stravingand prosecute owners.

## FISHING NOTES

Scamander Angling Club will hold a surf contest at Wrinklers Beach next Sunday 20th July from midday to 4 p.m. Please note that the location is Wrinklers and NOT Four Mile as previously advised. St.Helens Surf Angling Club held their Annual Dinner and Meeting last Saturday and from second hand reports, the evening was enjoyed by all. The weather has not been suitable for surf fishing the last few weeks and there is no news of any spectacular catches lately.

A few more notes from the Law on Amateur fishing may be of interest. An Amateur may have one beach seine net and two graball nets and no licence is required for these nets. The beach seine net must be no longer than 150 feet and have a mesh no smaller than 1½ inches. A graball net must be no longer than 150 feet and have a mesh no smaller than 4 inches. Netting is prohibited in most coastal rivers and lagoons. Anyone using a seine net in tidal waters must empty the net in the water. The net must not be drawn ashore while any fish remain in it.
