We can all help in the preservation of our island by taking care when camping for this is our heritage.

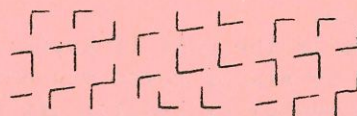
## DELIGHTS OF A PICNIC:

# YOU AND THE LAW FISHING NOTES

We receive so many queries from local residents, usually by phone, inquiring as to whether or not they can drive their unregistered vehicles to their nearest Police station for the purpose of having it registered.

The answer is "Yes" but it must be clearly understood that the law permits the use of an unregistered vehicle providing certain conditions are adhered to.

These conditions are:

(1) That the vehicle is, at the time covered with a third party Insurance policy, and that the Policy is in force.

(2) That the vehicle is being driven for the purpose of being registered and that it is not being driven for any other purpose.

(3) It could also be said that the vehicle ought to be driven to the nearest possible registering authority for the purpose of having it registered. In other words, if the vehicle was being driven from Seamander to St. Marys for the purpose of having it registered and the St. Marys police station was open to receive the registration, the driver of that vehicle could not by-pass St. Marys and proceed to Pungal to there carry out his transaction of registering his vehicle.

He would of course be permitted to do so if the St. Marys office was not open for business. But of course the authority to drive an unregistered motor vehicle for the purpose of having it registered, only applies during the times and day on which the offices of Stations are open for business. It does not permit unregistered vehicles to be driven on public Holidays, weekends, or after 6 p.m. on week days.

The ridged sandhills were spread around me like a shining contour map of the Sahara desert, and strewn about in a pleasing disorder lay discarded artefacts in great variety of shapes and colours; they looked to me like sharp pieces snatched at random from an archaic rainbow.

Sitting in the shining sunlight and dreaming up the peopled past I noticed a shadow on the sand and on looking up saw a long-legged dark girl coming towards me carrying an open worked string bag of shell fish. Drops of water were dripping from her short crinkly hair making her shoulders gleam in the sunlight, and I noticed the way her feet, thin and flat, delicately felt their way among the stones and tufts of prickly grass as if they had inbuilt eyes of their own-like little watch dogs they had been trained from early youth to look after their owner.

This girl, with slightly negroid features was about 5 feet tall, and after her swim there was a red-brown glow showing through the dusky skin. With a pleasant gentle expression she greeted me in a rather husky voice. Later on I distinctly remembered the musical quality of her voice, but could not recall the words or language we had used. She said her name was Nin-Negalla and that her tribe had always lived here, on the West coast of Tasmania. The great hero who had led her people to this place had strode along the curved sweep of beach, and then sinking down with his hands on his knees had remained there guarding his tribe for so long that he turned into stone. We call him Mt Cameron West in our ignorance, but he is really the dark guardian of the first people to occupy these parts, and sits there as a grey triangular figure, with teeth bared malignantly towards the sea, his hairy back sloping down towards the hinterland, and his fingers playing in the water. Nearer to where we were sitting there is an outcrop of sandstone, this is a very important and holy place where Nin-Negalla's people had engraved their history on the rocks, the circles within circles, footsteps and other symbols reveal to the initiated the whole history of a tribe at its beginnings in the far away dreamtime. These sandstone tablets happen to be in a perfect natural setting of bright colored flowering shrubs. In this remote and sacred place with waves crashing on rocks and sand so near there is an atmosphere of magic, of unity with a past we can but guess, but which stirs ones imagination to almost heard stamping and chanting.

Nin-Negalla softly sang some of her tribal songs, haunting music, the last of which was a lullaby so soporific that the sun had set when I awoke to a cooled landscape, and one that was empty of people, unless one counted that ancient guardian who, like Canute, was challenging the tide.

As the fourth and final round begins tomorrow bottom side St. Marys hold the key to the tussle for fourth position on the ladder. Avoca still only four points clear of St. Helens, with three matches remaining, meet St. Marys tomorrow in one of the most important matches of the season at Avoca.

Avoca seemed to have the position to themselves after they defeated St. Helens at St. Helens to move eight points clear.

But St. Helens pulled the surprise of the season by defeating Campbell Town at Campbell Town last Saturday.

Although St. Marys are bottom side they seem to have Avoca's measure as they have defeated them two out of the three times they have met this season-strangely enough the only two games St. Marys have won.

Another match being played tomorrow is the preview of the second semi-final between top dogs Fingal and Campbell Town at Campbell Town.

Fingal's only losses this season have been against the Robins in the first and second rounds, whilst the last time these teams met five weeks ago, Fingal triumphed by five goals.

Campbell Town have been weakened badly by the loss of consistently brilliant centre half backs Garry Upton through injury and all football followers will be hoping Upton's elbow trouble will enable him to participate in the final series.

I think Fingal, with enough big men to counterpart Brian "Snags" Leedham, should prove too strong for Campbell Town and thus go into premiership favouritism.

Swansea seem to be showing good form at the business end of the season and their clash with Fingal next Saturday should be a good opportunity for spectators to assess Swansea's premiership hopes.

Swansea rarely play well on the tight Fingal ground-but if they have premiership aspirations they will need to, because Swansea will play off the preliminary final there if they get that far.

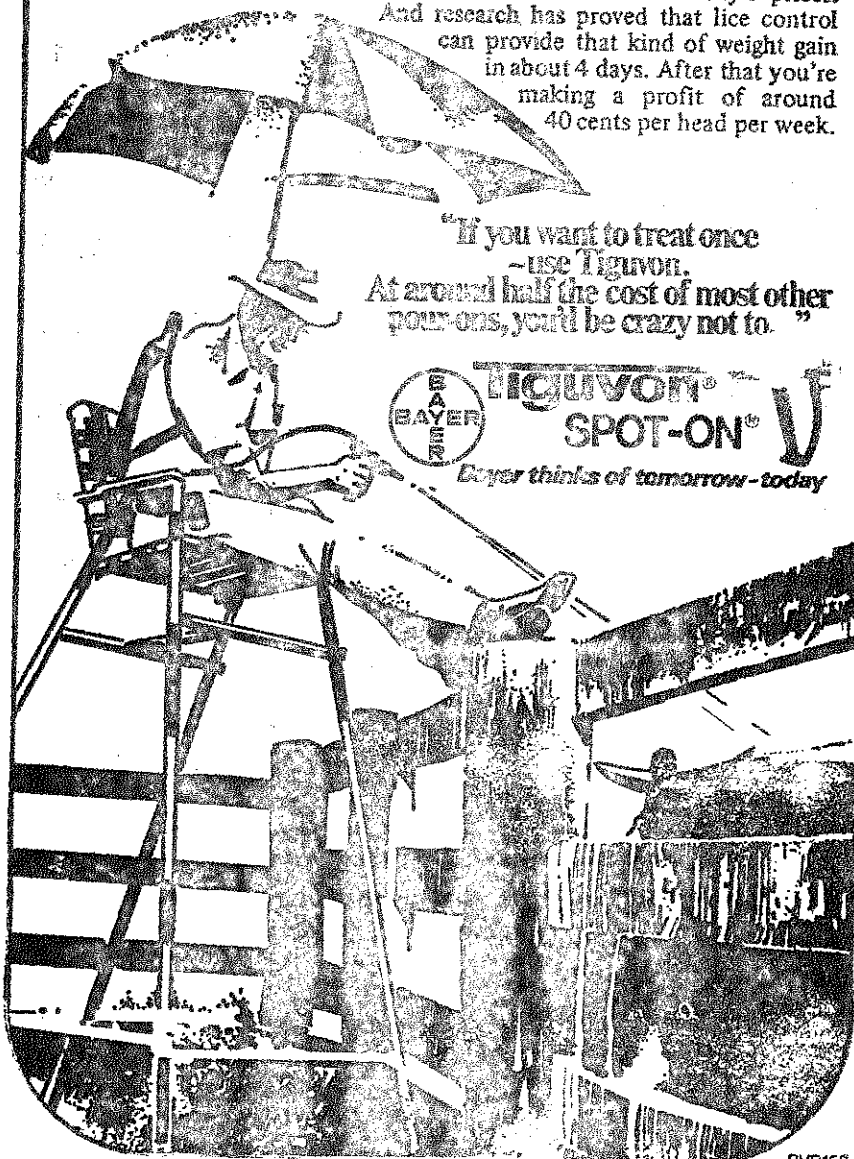

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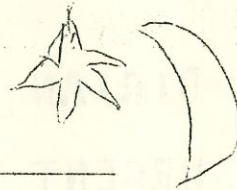
