

FDITORIAL

YOUTH!

The "you and the Law" column of the last edition of Valley Voice has prompted me to put pen to paper and air a few observations I have made since my arrival in St. Marys in January. I am not too clear on situations in Fingal and St. Helens and the other towns, but I would assume that this editorial will have interest to those people who live in these areas, as young people live there also. It doesn't need me to point out to you, that Youth is perhaps the most vital stage of a persons life, the ages between 12 and 25 are normally the most important years of ones life. It is during this period that people face enormous physical and psychological changes to ones life. During early years of youth, commonly referred to as puberty, the physical changes are accepted, but are the psychological changes? The young person wants to be "someone" and be independent and do things his own way. This is a very trying time for parents as a young person is moving from the complete dependance of childhood through the heartless independance of puberty until an interdependance is achieved in young adulthood. It is during this middle stage where parents need to be the most tolerant, because when all else fails the teenager comes running to his parents. It is this middle section which I am concerned about. People seem to try to disregard the 13-18 year olds. They make a mistake, and the whole community is on their back. They have nowhere to go, only the street corners and milkbars, and even then people look on them as "cluttering up" the street.



What is needed is somewhere for young people to go, a place to call their own. I call upon parents and other people with any concern for youth at all to make their voice heard, either through this paper or vocally to community leaders. Also I invite young people to let their voices be heard.

COMFRY CONTINUED from last edit.

Because it is rich in vitamin C it is excellent for colds, relieving throat irritations and huskiness. Dried comfrey leaf tea is made in Tasmania by Seilverwood Herbs. It's recommended by the grower, Stella Farley for arthritis, and the demand has now outgrown the supply. Best used 50-50 with other herb teas. Comfrey ointment is obtainable in health stores and is effective in healing wounds, corns sprains, and bruises, We apply freshly bruised leaves to wounds and sprains and have been amazed at the rapid healing power of this fuzzy plant. Leaves can also be heated in water, allowed to stand until lukewarm, pulped and applied with bandages. The story is told in Comfrey report No. 5 edited by Laurence Hills of how Comfrey poultices cleared up andadvanced case of cancer of the breast, As a vegetable Comfrey can be used in a salad mixed with lettuce and nasturtium leaves with a lemon and honey dressing; steamed like spinach, used as sandwich filling; roots can be grated and mixed with cheese. Flour has been made from Comfrey and there are many recipes for marmalade, chutney and wine. It contains protein, calcium, phosphorous, potash, cobalt, and manganese and is considered to be the only land plant able to extract vitamin B.12 from the soil, making it particularly beneficial to vegetarians.



Q. How is it possible for Bill to stand behind John, and John to stand behind Bill, at the same time.

I want to touch on the subject of "ownership, registration and change of address" of motor behicles for I have noticed that some owners, especially new owners, are not quite clear on the proceedure as regards the requirements of the Law.

Where the owner of a motor vehicle or trailer, sells or otherwise disposes of the motor vehicle or trailer, or changes his name other than by marriage, or some person repossesses the motor vehicle or trailer, the owner or the other person, as the case may be, shall within three days of the sale or disposal, change of name or repossession, as the case may be, notify the Registrar of Motor Vehicles in writing of the changes or ownership and the necessary forms can be obtained from my police station.

Where a motor vehicle is sold or other wise disposed of, the purchaser or the person to whom it has been disposed to, shall apply to the Registrar of Motor Vehicles to have the registration transferred to his name within fourteen days. Each transfer application shall be accompanied by:-

- (a) transfer fee
- (b) additional tax fees if applicable
- (c) the certificate of registration and third party Insurance Policy (both current)
- notice of change of ownership appli-(d)

You can now see that both the seller and the purchaser has an obligation to notify the Transport Department with all changes of ownership of motor vehciles or trailers and this includes all forms of vehicles which are required to be registered.

Too frequently we find that new owners of second hand vehicles fail to obtain from the registered owner at the time of purchase, the registration and insurance papers along with a change of ownership form signed by the previous owner. Without these papers a transfer of registrattion cannot be carried out unless the new omer is prepared to pay additional fees in respect of the unpreduced pupers. enced practice at St. Marys. 
