TREES

It cannot be stressed enough just how important trees are to humanity. They bring the rain, and use up the carbon dioxide released by the cities. Trees, by the action of sunlight on green foliage absorb carbon dioxide and releases oxygen, thereby being the most important asset this world has. There is evidence that the carbon dioxide is increasing, but our trees are decreasing, what will be the eventual effect on our oxygen balance?

The most sensible approach is for us to plant a tree. If every householder planted one tree, what a difference that would make. It has been estimated that 12 - 15 trees in a street will change the air, restoring it to its natural healthy condition in about 5-6 hours. In Tasmania we are very lucky, we still have lots of trees, so we have good air and rain.


The tree is a powerful water pump too, it sucks upwards with a force of thousands of pounds per square inch, gallons of water from quite deep in the earth, in fact as deep as its roots go. This is sent up to all the branches and leaves, and is transpired through the leaves into the air at the rate of 100 gallons per day from the average sized tree, this rises hundreds of feet into the air above the trees and condenses at night into dew, It's always cool under trees owing to the transpiration. They also help with erosion; planted along creeks on the banks they help to keep it in place. Blackwood (acacia melanoxylon) is a tree that loves a damp place; its extensive root system holds the bank well. Prickly, mimosa (acacia verticilata) is a smaller, faster growing shrub which serves the same purpose and likes the same conditions. These kind of trees in catchment areas will help to stop bad floods and loss of good soil.

It is not only forests which play a part in the maintenance of a favourable human environment, but also parks and avenues of trees, even single trees. Apart from their importance to mankind, trees are essential to the animal kingdom also, birds too. If you encourage birds you will have fewer pests but you must grow trees for birds. The leaves and bark fall down and make a mulch which insects inhabit and this helps the soil to conserve



moisture which helps the trees, in fact it's a wheel which entwines everything. We are all part of a whole, one part can't be hurt or destroyed without hurting some other part.




