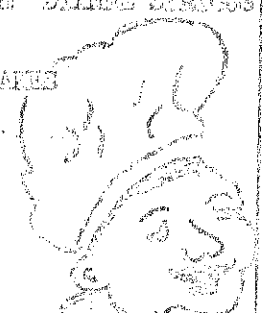

CHRISTMAS MEMORIES (a reader's story)

I can't recall at what age I first became aware of Christmas but throughout my childhood all my Christmases were a happy repetition. Thankfully my parents were poor and this meant that Christmas celebrations were simple.

Throughout the year, in spite of the constant efforts of my father, the roof leaked at the first heavy rain. As a result, much "elbow grease" had to be applied several days before Christmas to remove mould on the walls. Pictures were cleverly rearranged to hid water stains. Now we prayed the rain would hold off until after New Year.

They were certainly years to remember if we could afford new wall paper. The bathroom of course always got a new coat. Newspaper was cheap and what a way to record the years news - relaxing in the tub.

Christmas Eve meant transformation of our ramshackled old home. How beautiful it looked by evening. "New" curtains taken from amidst mothballs now hang in place of the faded old ones. Here they would stay for a few weeks until the time came to pack them away for another year. Beds proudly displayed "new" bedspreads, being rejuvenated by their annual wash and dying. The smell of freshly polished floors mingled with the scent of flowers. Sweetpeas and candytufts for the bedrooms, Fisherman's basket and roses for "the front room", Christmas lillies and Christmas bells for the kitchen.

Our evening meal was the happiest of all the year. Lamb chops, new potatoes and green-peas served on the table covered with new

oil-buize. After tea came the highlight of the day - the gathering of the Christmas trees. Armed with axes we could go carol-singing to select our trees - wild cherry for decorating, gums for tying to the verandah posts.

What joy came with observing a days work well done. The trees waving happily in their places of honour; the smell of grass, cut labouriously with a sickle, wafting all around; the fire glowing in the old fuel stove.

Darkness meant more pleasant tasks to perform - the tree to decorate with frayed tinsel and well worn paper bells, jellies to set, peas to pod and ginger beer and cake to put out for Santa.

Santa didn't care if we were poor for he always left wonderful things - a doll, a pineapple, paints and puzzles and a stocking filled with intriguing goodies.

There was never much time for admiring presents that morning for Christmas Day meant home-coming of the rest of the family. That meant much cooking. Dinner was served promptly at 12 o'clock. Golden roast turkey with all the trimmings and a huge, steaming pudding. By 2 o'clock every over-gorged person lazed around waiting for afternoon tea of ginger beer and countless kinds of cakes.

Christmas night was always kind of sad and ever so quiet with the family gone their separate ways for another year. But who could remain unhappy for long for childhood is a joyous time and a contented, peaceful heart ensured a perfect night's sleep.

CHRISTMAS - DO YOU KNOW?

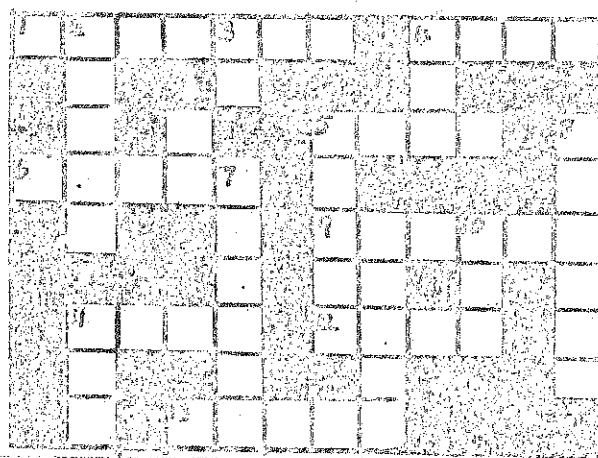
That no-one knows in what month Jesus was born. St. Luke's gospel tells us that shepherds were in the fields at night keeping watch over their sheep. It was the custom in Judea at that time to house the sheep in shelters during the winter time so many critics argue that His birth therefore was not in December.

That it was the leaders of the 4th century Christian Church that decided to hold a feast celebrating Christ's birth on 25th December. This date coincided with many pagan feasts. The Norwegian people held a festival in the dark winter month of December to entice their god's to bring back the Spring. During these festivals they used a human sacrifice. It was supposed to be the reigning king but a criminal was always used as a substitute.

The Romans held a feast of lights on December 25th to encourage the sun to shine more brightly for on this day it shone at its weakest.

That the tradition of the Christmas tree originated in Germany. Instead of the traditional evergreen, the first Christmas trees were flowering trees such as almonds or hawthorns. Although it was winter, branches or small trees were brought indoors at Christmas time to induce them to blossom on Christmas Day. If this happened it indicated a fruitful year ahead for the household. If it did not, it was a bad omen. Evergreens were later used, for evergreen represents immortality.

That the Dutch gave the world Santa Clause or St. Nicholas. And that the French and Belgians gave us the custom of hanging up stockings for him to fill.

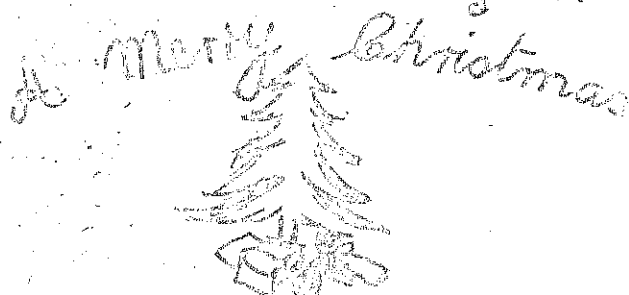

On the occasion of the official visit of the Lions International District Governor Max Cox on the 15th December, a dinner meeting was held at the Scamander Hotel/Motel.

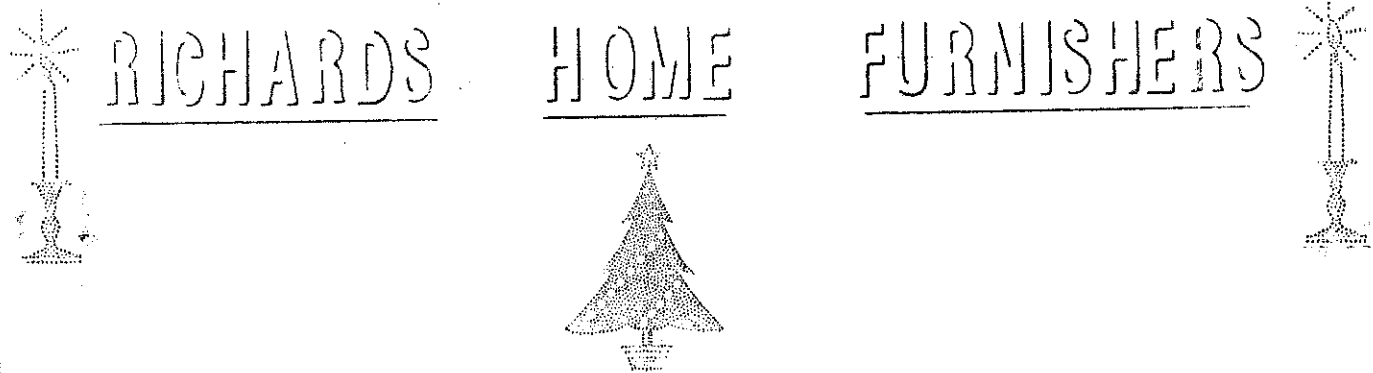
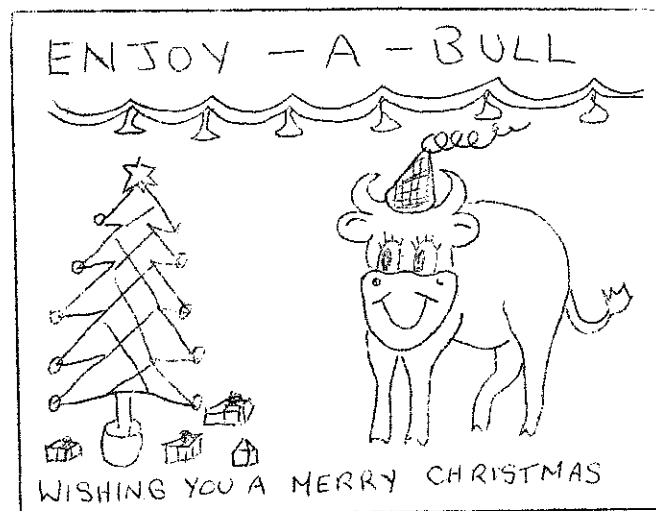
Approximately 70 persons attended.


