
PROPOSED ST. MARYS ORGAN CLUB INAUGURAF,

(f) To contact all music teachers in the ...

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
Dear Sir,

Nonymous in presenting his report, stated that the Committee were gravely alarmed by recent events. In the last few weeks of 1976, the locality had been infiltrated by various highly trained saboteurs, some claiming to be Members of Parliament representing the district and others who hoped to be Members. All these people had made the most dire

threats, the worst being the provision of an all-weather, all-the year-round access road over St Marys Pass. Other promises were reliable, static-free T.V. and radio reception and better and brighter H.E.C. supplies. The President appealed to all members to resist these things to the end. He reported that a successful operation had been carried out on the new Fern Tree Glen bridge. The sub-soil had been secretly hardened thus preventing the expensive pre-stressed concrete piles from being driven and further delaying completion of this offensive project. The meeting then went into committee to discuss future plans. The Treasurer reported a Debit balance of \$ 123-45 which was considered to be highly satisfactory. All office bearers were re-elected and the meeting concluded with the customary vote of no-confidence in the President.

## FISHING NEWS

Forthcoming events: Stinday 30th January Scamander Angling Club in the Scamander River from 12 noon to épm- entries at Boat Ramp by the bridge- fishing from the bridge is not permitted in this contest. Sunday 6th February, at St Helens Game Fishing Club Rally Day -Charter boats will embark crews at Bay View Hotel jetty no later than 8 am. On 15th January St Helens Surf Angling Club held their annual George Bay contest. Although no offical report has been forwarded, it is understood that the entries(approx.60) were well down on previous years. The only result reported so far was that the old master Jack Midson, made one of his rare appearances to land the heaviest flathead. St Helens Game Fishing Club were beaten by conditions at the barway on Sunday I6th January & the Rally was officially declared cancelled for safety reasons. In the meantime, when conditions have been favourable, both "Maybe" & "Miss Behave" have reported good catches of tuna. On a more disturbing note, a party of visitors at Falmouth netted the Henderson's Lagoon to return with over 4 dozen good sized bream. For information of all anglers, netting is prohibited in most coastal rivers & lagoonsunder State Fisheries regulations. This recent violation has been reported to the Inspectors & local anglers are watching for any future actions of this nature. Just remember that ignorance of the law is no defence. 
