The Tasmanian Tiger


With several reported sightings of the Tasmanian Tiger, or marsupial Wolf. Here are a few facts about one of our oldest residents — in fact it is extinct everywhere else in the world.

This ar imal resembles a wolf in general shape and carries its ears erect. It is about 45 inches long and its tail is about another 20 inches or so. Its course fur of grey-brown with a tawny tinge. On the back and shoulders it is marked with a number of transverse blackish-brown bands. Its head is like that of a dog with large eyes and mouth. The tail shorter than the body is thick at the base.

The pouch of the female opens backwards towards the hind legs. It has four distinct teats. The thylacine lives in holes which it digs for itself. It is not savage towards man and gets its name of "tiger" from the transverse stripes and from being carnivorous. It forages for refuse from the sea, or hunts smaller animals. Finding the trail of a small wallaby or other small quarry, it will proceed to run it down. The wallaby can easily outrun it but the thylacine is tireless, and when the wallaby stops to rest, the hunter soon comes into view. The tired wallaby gets up and runs again, but the thylacine keeps on following persistently and at last the wallaby can hop no longer. The thylacine then has his leisurely meal.

TOURISTS, ROADS AND TOWNSHIPS


Several townships in Tasmania have had roads built around them so that heavy traffic would not go through them, or block the main street. Was that a good idea? Why can't a road be built for heavy traffic only? The heavy traffic should not be going through a main street anyway as it is so dangerous for little children or older people who are a bit deaf or slow. FISHING NEWS

Forthcoming events :- St. Helens Game Fishing Club Cabaret at Bay Side Inn on Saturday 26th March to be followed by Club Rally Day on Sunday 27th March which also coinsides with the State Inter-Club Own Port contest. Entries to this must reach the secretary before 20th March. Scamander Angling Club surf contest at Four Mile Creek on 8th April (Good Friday) from 11am to 4pm with a casting contest from 10 to 11am. The event listed on the news letter as 8th May clashes with the annual Swimcart contest and is therefore postponed until 15th May. On Sunday 26th February, St. Helens Game Fishing Club had to cancel the third consecutive Rally due to bad weather on the barway. On a private charter trip three days later, our friend "Father" had replaced that missing hook and as a result he landed ten tuma for the day. Marlin were sighted on numerous occasions jumping from the water; but were not interested in the baits. Any day now, fishing history will be made when a lucky angler lands one of these fish. Wishful aspirants are reminded that they must be financial members of a club affiliated with the Australian Game Fishing Association before their catch will be recorded. In spite of the continous claims of a certain Tourist promotion officer, 32 members of the Scamander Angling Club fished at Wrinklers Beach last Sunday for four hours without a bite except for one lucky visitor, Mr.K.Wright who got a double strike and landed one mackerel and one mullet. The mackerel weighed 10 oz - where are these fish, Don?

Just in case anyone is luck enough to catch a few fish off the surf the current minimum sizes are:

Garfish 23cm (9in) Bream 23cm (9in)
Perch 23cm (9in) Flounder 23cm (9in)
Sole 23cm (9in) Flathead 30cm (11.81lin)
Mullet 20cm (7\frac{3}{4}) Real Trumpeter 33cm (13in)
Silver Trumpeter 33cm (15in)
With regard to Bream, the above size refers
to fish caught in the sea. The Inland

does not specify any minimum for this fish

although trout and flounder are listed at 220 mm. This apparently means that in waters controlled by this authority, it is legal to catch flounder which measures 10 mm less than those caught in waters controlled by the Sea Fisheries Division of the Popartment of Agriculture.

The Launceston Museum is asking for any unusually marked flathead which may be caught. Their expert, Mr.Scott, who always attends the Swimcart day to identify any fish, is making a survey of the various types of flathead in Tasmanian waters. So, if you are lucky enough to catch a flattie which looks unusual and if you are not too hungry, Mr.Scott would like to receive it (please keep it in your fridge until you go to Launceston).





Questions asked and Answers received in the Legislative Council regarding the St. Marys Pass by-pass.

NOTICES OF QUESTIONS

1. Mr. Shaw to ask the Honourable the Leader for the Government - Inreply to Questions asked on 8 November 1976, regarding the St. Marys Pass the Honourable the Leader for the Government replied: 'The Department of Public Works is to investigate a proposal to construct 7 km of new road to the east of the Tasman Highway by by-passing the St. Marys Pass. If the preliminary survey indicates that the proposal is feasible both from the construction and economic points of view, then detailed design work will be undertaken to enable the Government to consider including the project in next year's Road Programme'-<u>Question 1.</u> Has the Public works Department completed the proposed survey? Question 2, What further action is being taken by the Government to replace the St. Marys Pass with a safer and more permanent route?

THE LEADER FOR THE GOVERNMENT IN THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL REPLIED.

Answer 1. The investigation to establish the feasibility of constructing a by-pass to the St. Marys Pass is well advanced and the report is expected to be available by the end of the month.

Answer 2. The Government will be in a position to determine what action to take when it has received the investigation. reporte


