
A Community or Boxes?

Gardening Notes.

Do you grow so called rubbish along your fences? This protects the soil from wind and in Tasmania we are in the Roaring Forties so we get a lot of wind also if animals have a bit of shelter they do better and its a home for birds who a eat an awful lot of bugs which will eat your crops etc. and pesticides are not really much good. They are so poisonous they distroy more than one reslises. Do you mulch at all? This provides a cover for the earth worms so they can work your gardens for you and save you a lot of digging. Also this builds up the soil so vegetables are healthy and alive (At least until a mad cook gets hold of them) the worms make nice holes which the rain runs inta and the roots go down. The soil is turned over much better than we can do it and mulching and compost are so easy.

HERBS WILL HELP YOUR NATURAL BEAUTY.

Tired feet Nothing is worse than aching feet, they bring aging lines to any face so help your feet with herbs. Pick elderberry leaves, dry them and crush to a powder, add a little fuller earth to make a powder and dust the feet.

An old feceips is to put fern in your shoes of you have a long way to go, also fill your pockets with them.

Lemon or cider vinegar bath or rub is very helpfull, this will relieve fatigue and restore vigour to your feet, a few drops of lavenderoil in a tepid foot bath is also good.

Corns can be helped by using the juice of leeks in a foot bath every day and at night bind the corn up with the skin of the leek or tie a slice of onion or garlic onto the corn at night, this has great healing powers.

By Mr.Robin Gray, M.H.A., Member for Wilmot 10the March 1977.

The State Government should give a firm cmmitment to the people of Mathinna that sealing of the Mathinna- Fingal Road would commence no later than next summer, according to Mr. Robin Gray, M.H.A Member for Wilmot . Mr. Gray was commenting on an answer given him by the Minister for Main Roads Mr. Baldock, in reply to a question concerning the condition of the road. Mr. Baldock said that the road was in need of attention; that it would be resheeted in the Autumn; that it had been listed for consideration in planning for the next five years and it may be possible to commence reconstruction and sealing in the first half of the five year programme. Mr.Gray said that the area around Mathinna was generating and would continue to generate a great deal of wealth for the state and that the people who live, and work there deserve more consideration than they have received in the past. He said that the road was a disgrace and represented a serious hazard to the people who had to use it.


