TASMANIAN HYDATIDS CONTROL

There were only three new cases of hydatid disease in Tasmania during the 12 month period to December 1975, compared with five in 1974. Two were surgical cases and the third was a death caused by hydatids. But another six people who had previously had operations for the removal of hydatids cysts were readmitted for further surgery during the year. The Tasmanian Hydatids Eradication Council has been conducting a survey of human cases since 1966 when 19 cases were reported. But in spite of these encouraging figures, hydatids was the cause of the death of three Tasmanians in the past 20 months. Dr Trevor Beard said that the "hydatids disease, in Tasmania is a man-made disease because humans and stock are infected only by dogs and the infection of the dog is due entirely to its owner's neglect to control his dog and feed it correctly. Mr Pickmere the Secretary of the T.H.E.C. said that in spite of the drop in new cases the disease is still a killer. Mr Pickmere said that many hydatid patients were still suffering from the actions of their fathers or grandfathers who in all innocence had fed their dogs on offal not knowing the life cycle of the parasite. There would however be some cases coming for surgery, because symptoms of the disease were often not present until many years after infection.

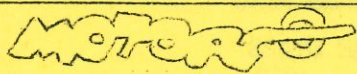

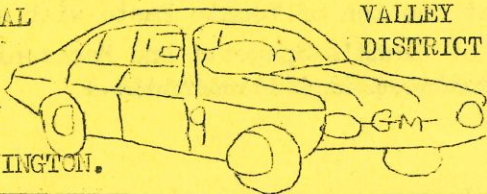

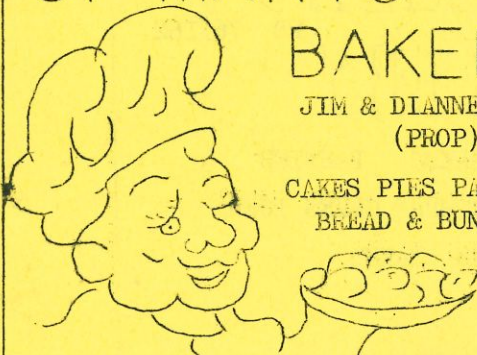

Other good players were Hans Gratzner with four fish totalling 2lb 5 oz and Bob Jackson with four fish totalling 1 lb 14 oz. For St. Helens, David Riley was outstanding with his 3lb blackback and Vaughan Oldham with four fish totalling 2lb 3 oz. Many notable anglers failed to live up to their reputations and St. Helens was serverely handicapped by the non-appearance of Jack Midson. Consistency was the secret of Scamander's success since nine of their twenty registered scores, while St. Helens could only manage seven out of eighteen.
