
Sunday afternoons are usually spent relaxing but of late a local shopkeeper has been noticed playing a very popular winter sport outside his place of business.

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

Dear Sir,

Through your columns, I should like to express my extreme appreciation of those people in the St. Marys, Fingal St. Helens, Cornwall and Bicheno districts who have given so generously to the Womens Shelter in Hobart. The Shelter is run by both voluntary and paid workers. Three salaries are shared among six women. The main house in Hobart has only three bedrooms and has accommodated up to twelve women and seventeen children at one time, so it can be easily seen how necessary the shelter is. Most women who come there are desperate and have no where else to go. They usually have drunken and often violent husbands, and often the childrens' lives are at risk.

At present there is no guarantee the Federal Government will continue to fund shelters and it does not look as if the State Government will be able to afford to be as generous as the previous government.

Thankyou all again. Your help is much appreciated. I might add that the beautifully hand knitted jumpers were the first new clothes some children had ever owned.


THOUGHTS ON OUR YOUNG PEOPLE

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
PUMPKIN PIE

Spread the filling and cover with the rest of the paste. Sprinkle 2 tablespoons of sugar on top and bake in a moderate over until brown.




